

## Siuslaw Union Accepts Budget

FLORENCE—Voters approved the budget for Siuslaw Consolidated School District 87J, 38 to 6, Monday's election, thereby assuring adequate teaching and providing facilities for the coming school term. Elected director was Shirl Jackson with 34 votes to Kenneth Horn's 18. A. S. Davidson of Mapleton, candidate for rural school board member in zone one, received 42 votes in the local election.

Florence City Dads held a special council meeting this week giving the green light to the government survey of the city's proposed new water system. Washington street dock was ordered closed while temporary repairs are being made.

All GIs interested in taking flight training at the Florence Municipal airport under the approved veteran's flight training program are requested to sign applications at the airport within the next ten days. Applications must be accompanied by photostatic copies of discharge, and should the discharge be printed on two sides, both must have photostatic copies made. Horn's Studio is equipped to do this work. Physical examination is a requisite and will be paid for by the government, this may be made either before or after application is made.

GIs taking a full flying program may obtain private licenses with a minimum of seven weeks or a maximum of nine weeks training to complete the course, which includes three and one-half hours flying time and four hours of ground school weekly. Ground school will be conducted at the high school three evenings a week, two hour periods each, with choice of evenings offered. Should it be impossible to carry a full flight training program, the time can be broken up in two or three periods until the course is completed.

Training will begin July 1, with Dale Hall and Ted Lewis, instructors anticipating more than 100 veterans.

Florence Volunteer Fire Department has received more of its new equipment for modernizing the department with a cylinder of Dugas and extension nozzle for use in controlling blazes between walls or ceilings being delivered this week.

With the approach of summer and the increase of recreational activity on the river and lakes, the purchase of a boat, motor and trailer for the Wm. Alguire memorial lifesaving fund becomes imperative.

It is hoped increased contributions will build the fund up enough to cover the purchase of this vitally needed equipment. Contributions the past week include \$2.50, Brownie Girl Scout troop No. 40 and North Fork Grange, \$10 to the Wm. Alguire fund and to the fire department sinking fund, \$10 from Mr. and Mrs. G. T. Dudley.

George H. Johnson, chairman, announces Siuslaw Soil Conservation District is now accepting applications for soil conservation work on individual farms. All those interested in the work program are urged to contact one of the supervisors and fill out an application.

## Loggers Nab Two Cougars

WALTERVILLE—Gerald Riley, Buel Eyerlin, and Harold Hart hunted and killed two cougars Thursday in the vicinity of the Booth-Kelly logging gate on the road opposite Walterville across the river.

The men were driving to their logging operations in the morning when one cougar appeared in the road ahead of their truck. They immediately decided that they would rather hunt him than log that day, so went back for Harold Hart and his hound and tracked the cougar, wounded him, treed him, and killed him. After skinning him they found only the one shot that killed him, decided another was around, and found and killed the one they had wounded. About a half hour's time elapsed between the two killings.

The kill was made five hundred yards from the Warren Anderson home and close to the gate where the Booth-Kelly road leads off from the county road. The cougars were yearlings and believed to be from the same litter. They measured 74 inches from tip to tip.

The men say that trucks were ahead of them and yet the cougars appeared in the road after the loggers were passing along the road. They believe that this killing will save a number of deer this summer.

Loggers coming out with their loaded trucks were surprised to see the dead cougar but doubly so when they saw two of them.
