

Dewey Best In GOP Poll

MADISON, Wis.—(U.P.)—Wisconsin state GOP convention delegates Monday gave the edge to New York Gov. Thomas E. Dewey as their choice for the presidential nomination but supporters of Harold E. Stassen hailed the polls as showing strong support for the

former Minnesota governor. Dewey, twice chosen by Wisconsin Republicans for the White House, won 321 votes. That was only 35 more than Stassen who has made two stump appearances in the state as the only announced GOP hopeful for the nomination.

General Douglas MacArthur, considered a native of Wisconsin despite his Arkansas birth, placed third in the poll with 157. He was far ahead of U. S. Senators Taft and Bricker of Ohio, and Vandenberg of Michigan.

Stassen has made no secret of the fact that he considers Wisconsin one of the crucial states in his campaign. He has pointed out that it was the state which broke the hopes of Wendell Willkie, another party "liberal."

It was noteworthy that of the 321 who listed Dewey as their first choice for the nomination, 91 listed Stassen as their second. Also, of the 286 who handed Stassen first place, 95 gave Dewey second. The combinations gave rise to speculation that a Dewey-Stassen ticket might be popular in the state.

BAR HARBOR, Me.—(U.P.)—Medical Examiner E. J. Johnson said Monday Blas Reyes, 65, Filipino chef who hanged himself in his jail cell a few hours after he attempted to shoot and stab Novelist Mary Roberts Rinehart, was temporarily insane.

Police found Reyes' body dangling from his cell door early Sunday. He had fashioned a noose from his clothing.

Sewer Line to Divert Into River in Storms

does not contemplate building a treatment plant large enough to treat peak storm water loads and that the cost of such a project would be prohibitive.

During peak storm flows the surplus will be diverted from the in-flowing line to the treatment plant and discharged into the river in any event, he said. He also stated that a number of diversions to the river are slated in Portland's sewer program.

Seeger called attention to the fact that the peak flow in the line will contain so much storm water that the ratio of sewage will be very small and that this will reduce the extent of river pollution.

Volume Purifies
Furthermore at such times the river itself is likely to be flowing an abnormally large quantity of water so that the pollution factor will be further reduced, he said.

Dr. Triolo, city and county health officer, said that the health department is aware of the diversion line to the river and recognizes that under the circumstances no better present solution of the problem is possible.

Separation Would Solve
The only solution that would approach complete control would be separation of the sanitary and storm sewers, he explained. This would make it possible for sanitary lines to carry all the sewage flow to the treatment plant, and the sewage-free storm water could go to the river.

Plans for the treatment plant are being redesigned to provide secondary treatment, and expanded to meet needs of growth since the original designs were made. Present indications are that it will cost in the neighborhood of \$275,000, Seeger said.

A construction fund of \$186,485 has been built up through the 25 cents per month paid by all sewer users. The city also has authority to issue \$85,000 in bonds for this purpose, to be retired by future collections of this sewer charge. (Tomorrow: Offset Manholes)

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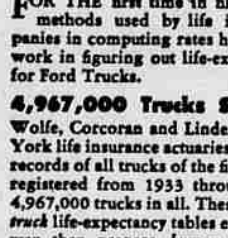
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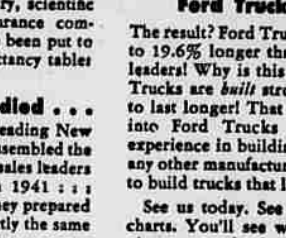
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Local Couple Fail to Change Maine Minds
