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Moose Report On Convention

Eugene T. Neuman, Eugene,
 was elected third vice-president
 of the Northwest Moose Assn. last
 week at the 32nd annual conven-
 tion in Spokane which culminated
 in the choice of Eugene as the 1948
 convention site. Northwest Moose
 last met here in 1940.

According to W. E. Heinke,
 Eugene, a past president of the
 Moose, the local delegation was
 the largest of any outside Spokane.
 He said 150 local Moose, including
 the men's chorus, attended.

Reitha Bauman, the chorus's
 choice for Oregon Trail Pageant
 princess, went up with the delega-
 tion and appeared on the three
 Spokane radio stations on chorus
 programs.

Heinke said the bearded Moose
 —by way of explanation—not in
 plugs for the Pageant wherever
 they appeared.

President Alf Swennes presided
 at the convention.

There were nearly 1000 regis-
 tered delegates at the Spokane
 meeting and local Moose expect a
 larger contingent at Eugene in
 1948. Invitations were extended to

 merce President John Snellstrom,
 and Gov. Earl Snell.

Few 'Serious' Riders Injured, Local Rodeo Co-Owner Avers

Henry Christensen, co-owner of
 the rodeo which will thrill Oregon
 Trail Pageant-goers on July 24, 25
 and 26, has known a lot of good
 rodeo performers, who come from
 many unexpected walks of life,
 and very few of the serious per-
 formers get hurt, he says.

The people who do get hurt, in
 Christensen's experience, are "the
 ones who stand around and watch
 the experts, taking a drag from
 time to time until they work up the
 explosive mixture of courage and
 stupidity to make them say, I could
 do better'n that."

Among expert rodeo riders are
 many unexpected people. Christen-
 sen counts among his rider-ac-
 quaintances a medical doctor in
 Tucson, Ariz., who bulldozes steers
 whenever the rodeos come to town,
 and a Sunday school teacher who
 rides broncos.

Sees High Total
 Christensen, like all good im-
 pressarios of almost every specta-
 tor-sport, claims that his sport
 brought the most spectators to any
 sport in the world last year. This
 high spectator-interest, mirrored
 in rodeo gate receipts, accounts for
 the high cost of bucking horses,
 according to the rodeo owner.

"Bucking horses are the highest
 priced horses in the world," he
 said, "averaging more money per
 horse than race horses do. A good
 bucking horse costs from \$6000

to \$10,000, and they aren't wild—
 they're trained to buck."

Purchase Offered
 Henry bought "Blackout," a
 bucking horse, for \$250 last year
 and several months ago he was
 offered \$6000 for the horse by
 Gene Autry.

"Nope," says Henry, "I didn't
 sell — Blackout pays for himself
 too good."

Prison Term Given Swindler

NEW YORK—(AP)—Jimmy Col-
 lins, 44-year-old gambler and play-
 boy of Broadway and Hollywood,
 received a 20-to-40-year prison
 sentence Monday after refusing to
 disclose what became of \$350,000
 of the \$804,000 swindled from the
 Mergenthaler Linotype Co.

Collins' co-defendant, Irving
 (Izzy the Eel) Cohen, received a
 sentence of 7 1/2 to 20 years for his
 part in the swindling of \$804,000
 within one year from the Brook-
 lyn firm by means of fraudulent
 invoices and phony checks.

For Collins, a dapper former
 convict who associated with Hol-
 lywood actresses, his refusal to
 disclose where the money was
 cached was the biggest gamble of
 his career.

Kings County Judge Samuel S.
 Leibowitz last Monday had given
 him a one-week stay of sentence
 to make up his mind about re-
 vealing the whereabouts of the
 money. If he refused, Leibowitz
 warned, he never would "live out-
 side of prison for one day to spend
 a penny of your ill-gotten gains."
