

Mohawk Add to Springfield Gets 95-Home Development

SPRINGFIELD — A building project totaling \$700,000 is under way in the Mohawk addition here, with ten new homes out of the 95 scheduled already partially completed.

Mohawk Addition lies west to east from Twelfth St. to Sixteenth St. and south to north from I St. to K St. It is just north of the proposed Willamalane Park and two blocks from Union High School.

Financing and construction are being handled by the Peterson Mortgage Co. and Brighter Homes Store, both in Eugene.

Five Rooms
The plans call for five-room homes, including two bedrooms. There will be a large garage with overhead doors and a utility room. Each house will have hardwood floors and an automatic oil furnace. The floor plan of each home will be similar but there are ten different outside appearance styles which will be thoroughly mixed throughout the four streets of the addition.

Each home will be constructed a different distance from the front of the lot. All lots in the subdivision are 65 feet wide and 95 feet deep.

Two Streets
According to the plans, two new streets running in an east-west direction will be constructed and the eastern end of the addition, which lies next to the proposed

new Mohawk Boulevard, will be left open for the development of a commercial shopping center.

E. H. Peterson, of Peterson Mortgage Co., said the entire project has the sanction of the FHA and the houses are all being constructed according to FHA specifications.

Sees Sound Basis

He said the project is not a "fly-by-night" affair, and that financing for the completion of the 95 houses has already been lined up, through Prudential Insurance Co., which assures "that the project will not be half completed and then abandoned."

Frank Coen of the Brighter Homes Store, which is building the homes, said they expect to complete ten houses a month. He said that if "everything goes well" it is anticipated that over 100 more homes will be constructed in an addition which lies just north of the present Mohawk site.

It is hoped that the homes can be sold for less than \$7000, including the lot and such improvements as sewers, water supply, and black top macadam streets.
