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Firemen Warn Of Dried Grass

Eugene Fire Department warned Saturday that a "bumper" crop of grass, caused by heavy late rains, will provide good kindling for grass fires when it dries.

The department asks all owners to cut their grass at once, adding that the city maintenance department will mow an average lot for two dollars. Another serious fire hazard during summer months is accumulation of moss, dry leaves or debris on roofs. Home owners are advised to see that their roofs, as well as their back yards are cleaned as soon as possible.

The fire department began its annual fight against grass-fires by extinguishing several during the warmer days of June. "Grass fires are avoidable, yet they require the use of equipment while more valuable property is left unprotected," the department said.
