Washington, Syracuse Yearlings Threaten Harvard Looms as Olympic Crew Champ

SEATTLE, June 30—(AP)—Look out, Olympics—here comes Harvard!

Coach Tom Bolles' boatload — "the best sprint crew I ever coached" — knifed down a glassy-calm 2000 meter course Saturday to win the second annual Lake Washington Regatta in the unofficial world record time of 5 minutes, 49 seconds.

The 11 crews which trailed the great crimson galley were wondering today if there still were holes out there in the water where the Harvard oars dipped with such terrific power.

To Harvard the unofficial American sprint championship. Coach Tom, with a sly grin, reminded post-race handshakers he'd have five of those oarsmen back next year with which

to build his eight for the Olympic bid.

A scant three-quarters length behind as Harvard flashed past the finish buoys was Yale, which set the early pace and then came two green but powerful crews which will be around next year to dispute the Harvard right to the Olympic call.

They were the freshmen of Washington and the yearlings of Syracuse, and the young giants of both shells later bemoaned their lack of experience in racing.

The judges, who had to sight over 720 feet of water to get the placings, delayed their decision on all places after third until they could view motion pictures, five hours after the race. They placed Syracuse fourth; Cornell, the defending

champion, fifth; California, sixth, and Wisconsin seventh.

Princeton and M.I.T. ran a dead heat for eighth, Penn was tenth, Columbia 11th and U.C.L.A. making its first appearance in a major regatta, 12th and last.

The record will go into the books as the best for any kind of water. Experts still were thumbing record books today, but the best time that could be found for the distance was Yale's 5:51 against Navy in 1928 in the current of the Schuylkill River. Believed the best previous still water effort was Washington's 6:02 during the Olympic trials.

Both Yale and Washington were under six minutes—5:51.8 for the Bulldogs and 5:51.9 for the Huskies.

Patty Scores Another Upset Brown, Kramer Other Yankee Net Victors

WIMBLEDON, Eng., June 30—(AP)—The United States won three of the four places in the men's singles semi-finals of the Wimbledon tennis championships Monday when Jack Kramer, Tom Brown and Budge Patty won their quarter-final round matches.

The fourth place went to Dinny Pails, the Australian Davis Cupper, who defeated Bob Falkenberg of Hollywood, Calif., 4-6, 4-6, 6-3, 6-0, 6-2. Falkenberg, who was ranked No. 8, was the first seeded U. S. player in the tourney eliminated.

Kramer, the U. S. singles champion, who is seeded No. 1, defeated Geoffrey Brown of Australia, 6-0, 6-3, 6-3; Tom Brown, seeded No. 3, turned back the Defending Champion Yvon Petra of France, 7-5, 6-2, 6-4 while Patty, scoring his second upset of the tournament, beat Jaroslav Drobny of Czechoslovakia, 3-6, 6-4, 7-9, 6-2, 6-3.

In the semi-finals, Kramer will meet Pails in the lower bracket while Tom Brown will face Patty in the upper.

Barclay Wins N.C.A.A. Golf

ANN ARBOR, Mich., June 30—(AP)—The NCAA golf championship, a springboard to fame for numerous young linksmen, today belonged to methodical Dave Barclay of the University of Michigan.

Barclay won the title in the 50th annual intercollegiate tournament here Sunday. He defeated Jack Coyle of Louisiana State 1 up in the 36-hole final.

Barclay, who succeeds Walker Cup Star George Hamer of Georgia as the collegiate champion, advanced to the finals by defeating Lou Stafford of Oregon, 2-1.

At the conclusion of the tournament, Chairman Ted Payson of Northwestern University, announced the 1948 event had been awarded to Stanford University. It will mark the first time in history that the event has gone to a far-western school.

Tacoma Shooter Wins Western ATA Crown

PORTLAND, June 30—(AP)—Earl Colson, Jr., 28, Tacoma, cracked 125 straight clay pigeons Sunday to win top honors in the American Trapshooting Association's western zone finals.

Colson added 100 straight to the 88 he broke Saturday to the Fred Perkins, Pendleton, and Bill Meyerhoff, Spokane, then he broke 25 straight in the shoot-off. Perkins had 24, Meyerhoff 23.

Mrs. Jan Cameron, Denver, won the women's title with 194 of 200. Colson tied with Walt Nusom, Quincy, for the all-round title, when both turned in a 380x400.

A flip of the coin awarded the honor to Nusom.

Ed Schott, Selah, Wash., downed 99 birds from 22 yards to win the handicap event. Ben Baldrige, Springfield, outshot G. E. Newton, Independence, and Clarence Townsend, Salem, in a shoot-off for second place.

Ray Glass, former state singles champion from Eugene, fired 97-88, and Ruth Ray of Eugene hit 78 in the women's division.

Benton-Linn champions for district honors. The Eugene team annexed the Lane County championship Sunday at Civic Stadium by defeating Cottage Grove 21-6. Only loss in league play was the second-place Springfield.

Eugene took a 12-1 lead in the first two innings, but Coach Tom Cox' Grovers rallied with four runs in the third when Don Sigmund took the mound for the Eugene team. He struck out five straight batters and had nine strikeouts while holding the visitors to one run the remainder of the game.

Sigmund was also the leading hitter with "three for five." Delmar Peake collected "two for four," and Jimmy Barnes scored four runs without an official time at bat. He walked four times and was hit by a pitched ball the fifth time. Secondbaseman Kirkpatrick garnered two of the five Grove hits.

Angels' Lead Cut by Seals

Four home runs virtually erased Los Angeles' once big lead in the Pacific Coast League Sunday but the Angels clinched the honor of playing host to the annual all-star game.

The four circuit clouts, by Sacramento's resurgent Solons, dumped Los Angeles twice in a Sunday double bill, 6-4 and 6-2, and sliced the Angels' lead to a single game over San Francisco.

But by virtue of that narrow margin, Los Angeles won the right to meet the pick of the Coast League's stars on its home diamond in the annual game July 7.

The Seals moved back into contention by nipping Oakland, 2-0 and 4-3. Seattle and San Diego split, with the Rainiers nosing ahead 9-8 in the opener and San Diego taking the nightcap 1-0. Hollywood and Portland also split, 8-5 for the Stars and 5-1 for the Beavers.

Hogan Leads Money Golfers

CHICAGO, June 30—(AP)—Ben Hogan, Hershey, Pa., was back on top as the nation's best paid tournament golfer today after picking up the \$2000 check which went with first place in the Chicago Victory Open.

Hogan's victory boosted his 1947 tournament earnings to \$16,587 and put him back in the top spot he held throughout 1946. He turned in a sub-par score in every one of his four trips around the comparatively easy Westward Ho course. His total—270 strokes for 72 holes—was 14 under par and the lowest score ever recorded in the match.

Slammin' Sammy Snead, Hot Springs, Va., failed to recover from a disastrous third round and finished with 274 and second place in the tourney.

Ellsworth Vines, former tennis star from Los Angeles, was third with 275, and Jim Ferrier, Australian-born pro who won the PGA tournament at Detroit last week, was fourth with 276.

It was Hogan's first tournament victory since he won the Colonial Invitational in May and the third time he has won a Chicago tournament in the past seven years.

In the amateur division, John Barnum, Chicago, finished with 285, one stroke under par, and five less than his nearest competitor, Wilford Wehrle, Louisville.

When all the scores were in, tournament officials found that 17 golfers had shattered par and two more, Jim Demaret, former leader of the money winners, and Bob Hamilton tied it.

Johnny Revolta, who tied Fred Haas, Jr., New Orleans, for fifth place among the professionals teamed with Barnum to win the pro-amateur title with an aggregate score of 562.

Tigers Threaten Loop Lead Again

Detroit's tough luck Tigers are back in the running today mainly on account of Hal Newhouse's inexplicable jinx over the St. Louis Browns.

Muddy Ruel's cellar-dwellers bowed to Newhouse's southpaw slants for the 15th straight time Sunday as the Tigers took both ends of a doubleheader, 7-5 and 6-1. In winning their fourth straight at home, the injury-riddled Bengals climbed into a third-place tie with the Philadelphia Athletics.

Paul Trout hung up his seventh triumph in the nightcap before he retired in the sixth inning with a sore arm.

Robinson Has Best Day
Bob Elliott drove in the winning run in the first game and was the batting star of the second as the Boston Braves beat the Phils twice 8-7 in 10 innings and 4-2.

The twin victory enabled the Braves to move into first place in the National League pennant race, half game ahead of the Brooklyn Dodgers who split with the Giants in New York.

Although Jackie Robinson enjoyed his best day as a major leaguer, the Dodgers could not get better than a split with the Giants before 52,147 fans at the Polo Grounds. Brooklyn won the first 4-3 and lost the second 9-5.

Robby drove in the tying run in the ninth-inning single in the opener and scored the winning run on Arky Vaughan's pinch single after he had stolen second. The Negro flash got four hits in five times at bat in the second game to extend his hitting streak to 16 consecutive games.

Cincinnati and St. Louis split a twin bill, the Reds winning the opener 9-7 and the Cards coming back to bury Cincinnati 17-2 in the second game. Enos Slaughter, the Cards' star leftfielder, drove in 10 runs, seven in the second game.

Higbe Wins 100th
Kirby Higbe won his 100th Major League game when he pitched the Pittsburgh Pirates to a 10-4 win over the Cubs in Chicago.

Boston fandom, overjoyed at the Braves climb into first place in the National, was somewhat sobered by the Red Sox' double setback at the hands of the Athletics, 3-2 and 6-5. Ted Williams banked his 13th homer for the Red Sox in the finale.

Four Chicago White Sox hurlers held the Cleveland Indians to four hits to register a 4-3 victory in the opener of a scheduled doubleheader. The second game was postponed by rain.

The Yankees and Senators split a doubleheader in Washington, the Nats winning the opener 8-1 and the Yankees the second 2-1.

Betty Jameson Fires 70 for Open Title

GREENSBORO, N. C., June 30—(AP)—Betty Jameson of San Antonio, Tex., finally wore the Women's National Open golf crown after a year of waiting, climaxed by her course-record score in the final round of the tournament Sunday.

A year ago she was a contender until the final day of the Open before losing out to Patty Berg. This year Miss Berg was 11 strokes behind at the finish as Miss Jameson rocked the record books with a scorching 70 on the final 18 holes for a 72-hole total of 285, nine under par.

As Miss Jameson picked the \$1200 first prize, two amateurs—Polly Riley of Fort Worth, Tex., and Sally Sessions of Muskegon, Mich.—tied for second with 301 total.

The second ranking professional was Helen Dettweiler with 309 and Miss Berg was next at 310. Pro Mary Moezel of Portland, Ore., had 314.

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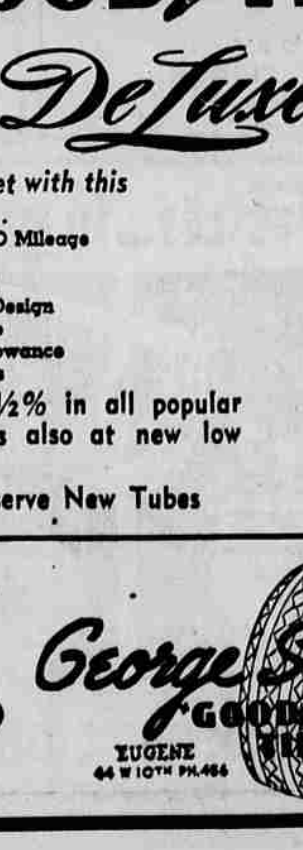


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
