But Hollywood songwriter Bud Averill, who wrote the tune, had a different opinion. If other songwriters could get by, he cried indignantly, why couldn't he?

Radio listeners long have had a diet of singing commercials, for which stations are paid, and tunes like Averill's, for which they aren't. "In My Merry Oldsmobile," was the forerunner and the line, "Riding the range in a V-8" in the tune "I'm an Old Cowhand," started the modern deluge.

Eugene Rises In Building List

Although building permits issued in Eugene during April fell off nearly \$100,000 from the March level, Eugene climbed from third to second place in the state in amount of permits issued, according to the June issue of the Oregon Business Review, publication of the school of business administration at the University of Oregon.

April permits for Eugene had a total estimated valuation of \$268,685; Portland, had, \$2,283,250; Salem had \$214,828. Permits issued in March were for: Eugene, \$386,557; Portland, \$3,813,785; Salem, \$832,773.

New residential permits taken out in the three cities during April were: Eugene, \$155,400; Portland, \$1,124,000; Salem, \$122,150. Permits for non-residential construction exclusive of alterations and repairs were estimated at: Eugene, \$11,650; Portland, \$534,770; Salem, \$92,084. In non-residential construction during April Eugene was topped by Coos Bay, Corvallis, Medford and The Dalles.

The estimated value of all permits issued in the state during April, 1947, was over \$3,600,000 less than those issued in April of 1946.

Portland registered the largest drop, from \$4,470,174 in 1946 to \$2,283,250 in April, 1947. Eugene and Salem dropped from their April, 1946 figures of \$386,169 and \$287,798 respectively, to the April 1947 totals given above.

Beaver Boys Name Own Official Panels

CORVALLIS — (AP) — High school youths from 51 Oregon towns, here for their annual governmental lesson in the American Legion-sponsored "Beaver Boys State," turned Tuesday to election of county officers.

The 284 boys, who organize their own government while here, will take up state primaries Wednesday.

They named city officials Monday with Dick Kemper and Don Beals, Salem, among the five mayors named. Beals also was named editor of the mimeographed daily newspaper of the session.
