

Secrets Theft Trial Snagged

WASHINGTON—AP—The Justice Department hit a security snag Friday in its plans to prosecute two former Army sergeants accused of taking secret atomic bomb data from the Los Alamos, N. M., plant.

A department spokesman said that by bringing the two men to

trial in open court the government would be forced to "reveal the very thing it has spent millions to keep secret." The war veterans could insist on their constitutional right of trial by jury.

However, the Justice Department source said every effort is being made to determine how the men could be punished without risking disclosure of the atomic secrets involved. The sergeants allegedly took photographs of a bomb machinery as "souvenirs."

Some members of the Joint Congressional Atomic Energy Committee said several prints could easily have been made from the negatives. The FBI is investigating to learn if any such prints still are in circulation.

Students See Building Hope

35 per cent student money, 45 per cent federal money.

McArthur Court, \$208,446, 100 per cent student money.

Hayward Field improvements and part of grandstand cost (\$80,589) came out of student building fees, the remaining \$85,280 came from athletic receipts.

Infirmity Aided
The student infirmity, \$116,371, was built partly from gifts, partly from federal funds and partly from student building fees.

The press and multipurpose, \$19,154, was built from University of Oregon press funds.

The dormitories are paid for entirely by student dorm fees.

State Helped
Before 1925, the state somehow managed to build all the university installations without the help of student fees. Deady Hall, oldest building on the campus, was built by Eugene pioneers who mortgaged their cattle and crops in order to insure the construction of the hall and the founding of the state university at Eugene.

In 1935 the state legislature took over the student building fund, which had been voted voluntarily upon themselves by the students with certain specific ends in view, and proceeded to base the entire university construction program on this fund.

Matched Funds
Dr. Harry K. Newburn, university president, explained Friday that this was necessary at the time, "because no state funds were available, and the money had to come from somewhere to match the PWA money which was available."

"But especially in view of the large amount of building already accomplished by the student fund, the state board now recognizes the logic in the assumption that student fees should be used for buildings of an extra-curricular nature," Dr. Newburn said, "and that state funds should be used wherever possible to construct buildings of a purely educational type."

Gifts, Fees
The Erb Memorial Student Union, for which the present drive is attempting to raise \$200,000, will be paid for by a combination of gifts and student building fees. The student building fee fund has been used to underwrite the initial \$800,000 expenditure for which bonds have been floated.

The other \$800,000, it is hoped, will be raised from Lane Countyites who derive so much cultural and monetary benefit from the university's location here, and from university alumni who know what student union would have meant to them and want to help make it possible for those students yet to come.

Fact-Finding Mission Set for China, Korea

WASHINGTON — AP — Lt. Gen. A. C. Wedemeyer will leave immediately for China and Korea with political and financial advisers to make a fact-finding report on conditions in those countries, the White House announced Friday.

Wedemeyer will undertake the mission as President Truman's special representative with the rank of ambassador.

Wedemeyer is expected to return to the United States and report to President Truman within six weeks.

Wedemeyer served in China before the last war. And in November, 1944, he was named commander of the U. S. forces in China, after serving for three years on the War Department general staff.

Moody-Hendrickson Lumber Co., Eugene, Friday filed articles of incorporation at the state capital in Salem. The firm listed \$15,000 in preferred and \$10,000 common stock.

Margaret had been engaged twice before. But in each instance her fiancé died shortly before the wedding.

But last month when she married Gaylord Folk, a Cleveland school teacher, it appeared as though Margaret's third attempt was a charm.

Happily, the couple set out for a honeymoon at Yellowstone Park by automobile. Their automobile collided head-on with another car in Marengo, Iowa Monday. Margaret was killed. Her husband was critically injured.

Margaret's body was brought home Thursday. She will be buried beside the grave of her sister, Elizabeth, who was killed 20 years ago while shopping for a wedding trousseau.

Navy Appropriation Compromise Told

WASHINGTON — AP — Senator Saltonstall (R-Mass.) said Friday a Senate-House conference committee has agreed on a Navy appropriation bill allowing expenditure of "just over four billion dollars" in the current fiscal year, more than \$200,000,000 below President Truman's request for the Navy.

He said House conferees have agreed to accept part of Senate increases that will allow the Navy 395,000 men and 42,000 officers during the 12-month period beginning last July 1.

He said the compromise also provides \$78,000,000 contract authority for purchase of new naval aircraft for anti-submarine patrol and reconnaissance.

Saltonstall told reporters: "I think that this will give us the numbers of men, ships and aircraft needed for an effective fighting Navy during the next year."

Cuts Unexplained

Hector Moore, 1331 High St., was hospitalized at Sacred Heart at 1:30 a.m. Friday with unexplained cuts on his legs. Police were called by a neighbor and took Moore to the hospital, but were unable to determine how Moore received the cuts. His doctor was not available for a statement.

Chiang Plans Army Shuffle

SHANGHAI — AP — Chinese reports Friday predicted a major reshuffling of the Nationalist command in Manchuria in a move to step up the government counter-offensive against the Communists.

A Peiping dispatch said that Nationalist Chief of Staff Chen Cheng was leaving soon for Mukden to supervise the reorganization. It added that Chiang Kai-shek personally may visit Mukden to straighten out "numerous problems."

In this connection, neutral reports from Manchuria told of alleged personal grievances between Gen. Hsiung Shih-Hui, director of Chiang's field headquarters in the Northeast, and Gen. Tu Yu-Ming, commander-in-chief of the Nationalist force in Manchuria.

Pro-government dispatches indicated the Nationalist position in months of bloody fighting.

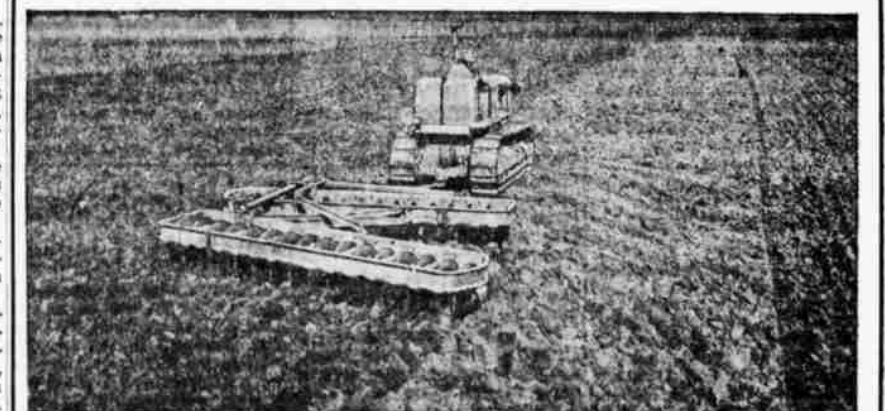
Earlier reports said the Communists also captured Tsinan, 35 miles southwest of Tsinan.

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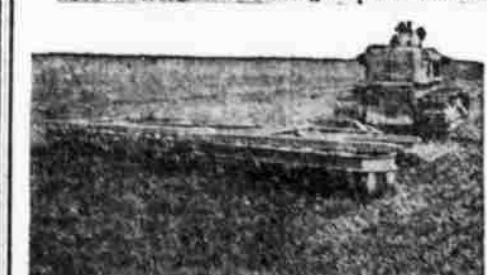
