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## Reedsport Mills Start July 21

Reedsport mills of this vicinity, closed July 3 for the holiday week-end and annual vacation period, will again begin operation on July 21.

Filling of the site of the new lumber mill to be constructed here by Charles Marschreck and associates is practically completed. The mill, to be of 40,000 to 50,000 board feet capacity, will be located along the Southern Pacific right-of-way a short distance south of Reedsport, construction of which will be rushed upon completion of the filling.

Marschreck came to Reedsport from Olympia, Washington, as first general manager of the Bridge Lumber Co. He has recently been engaged in logging operations on Smith River, from which place logs for the new mill will be obtained.

Construction of the new Gardner National Bank building in Reedsport is also progressing according to Tom Lillebo, contractor. Bank officials hope to get moved into the new quarters by October unless held up by delay in securing fixtures, etc., according to Willie Ekblod, cashier.

The new gravel plant of the Umpqua River Navigation Co. will also be put into operation within a few days according to Supt. Ed. Morris. Machinery has been installed and is ready for use but starting operations have been postponed until the building is entirely completed. A new crusher and new screen have been added to the machinery from the old plant, expected almost to double the output of small rock.

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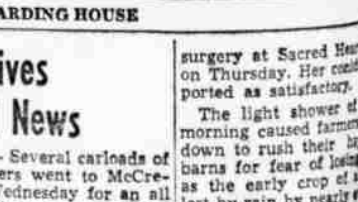
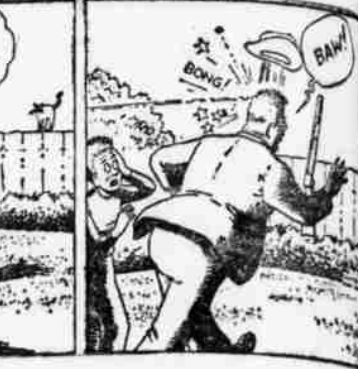
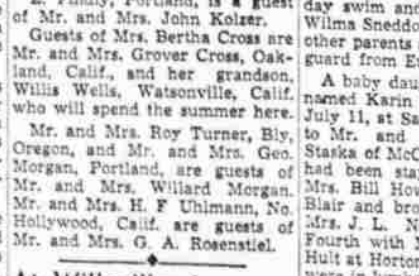
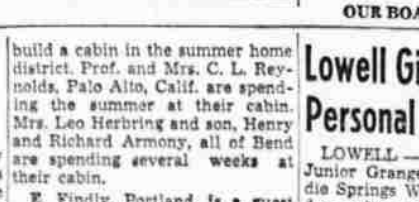
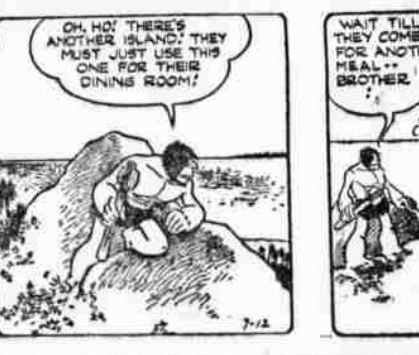
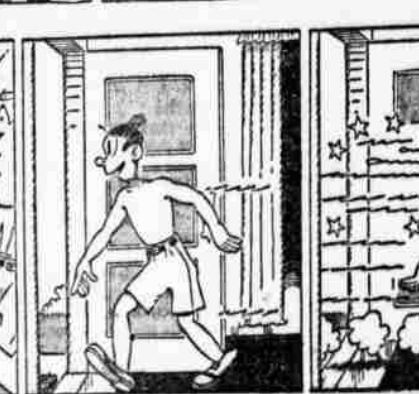


## McKenzie Bridge Women Meet
