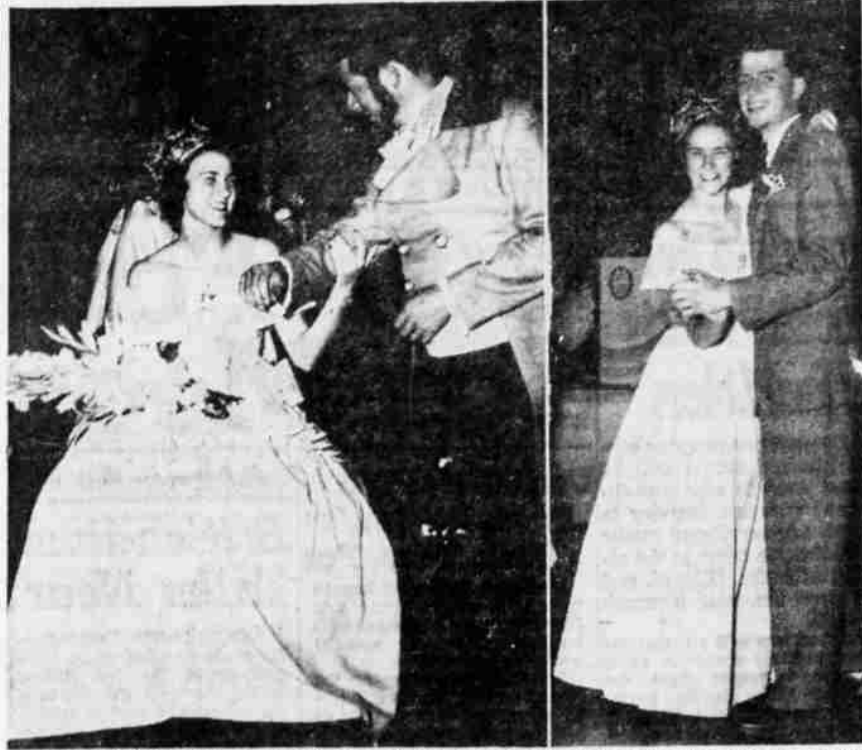
## Gurrier Gets Timber Rights at Auction

In an auction sale conducted Friday by the Willamette National Forest, the C. W. Guerrier Lumber Co. obtained rights to a tract on Fall Creek at the appraised value of \$20,918.30. Douglas fir was priced at \$4.90 per thousand. Valuation of \$3.60 was set on western red cedar, hemlock and other species.

The land consists of an estimated 3,383,000 board feet of Douglas fir, 517,900 board feet of western red cedar, and 689,000 board feet of western hemlock and a few other bidders at the sale which took place in the offices of the Forest Service.

## Music Composition Subject of Lecture

A system of musical composition tabulating all of the mathematical combinations of the elements of music will be explained and discussed by Miss Merle Montgomery of New York, in an illustrated lecture on the University of Oregon campus Wednesday afternoon, July 16.

Originated by the late Joseph Schillinger, Russian-born composer, who taught at Columbia university until his death, the Schillinger System permits a composer to exercise his intellect and construct articulate music with order and structure. Some of the better-known users of the system include the late George Gershwin, and Vernon Duke, composer of "Cabin in the Sky."

The campus lecture will be at 4:00 p. m. in Room 104 music building. It will be open to the public.

## Biddle's Name Is Withdrawn From UN Post

WASHINGTON — (AP) — President Truman Saturday broke a five-months' deadlock over the nomination of Francis Biddle to be United States representative on the United Nations economic and social council by withdrawing the appointment at Biddle's request.

Biddle, a former attorney general under President Roosevelt, accused Chairman Arthur H. Vandenberg (R-Mich.) of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee of bottling up the nomination since Jan. 29. Biddle preferred a showdown, he said, but there was no chance of action before the adjournment of Congress.

He asked that another appointment be made, since the council in March held one meeting without American representation and has scheduled another for July 19.

Mr. Truman complied by nominating Willard L. Thorp, 48, of Westport, Conn., now assistant secretary of state for economic affairs. Thorp will serve in both positions without added compensation if the Senate confirms him.

Thorp has held several high governmental economic posts since being an economics teacher at the University of Michigan and Amherst College ("ass."). Thorp was director of the U. S. bureau of foreign and domestic commerce for the first three years of the New Deal.

Republican opposition to Biddle is reported to have stemmed from his New Deal viewpoint. Some members of Vandenberg's committee intimated in May that such a viewpoint should not be carried to the U. N. council.

## Couple Who Beat Girl Await Sentence

GRANTS PASS — (AP) — Mrs. Lucille Medlin and Hugh Gilreath Saturday were awaiting sentencing on charges of assault with intent to kill, after confessing to abandoning of Mrs. Medlin's badly beaten daughter, Mary Jane, 2, at Weed, Cal., June 15.

On separate arraignments, the pair waived preliminary hearings and entered pleas of guilty. Circuit Judge Orville J. Millard set 10 a. m. Monday as time for sentencing.

In entering his plea, Gilreath told the court, "I did wrong and expect to be punished for it."

Mrs. Medlin told authorities she beat the child and asked Gilreath to take Mary Jane to Weed and leave her because she was "lots of trouble."

Mrs. Medlin told authorities she had lived with Gilreath the last 11 months but that he is not Mary Jane's father.

LOS ANGELES — (AP) — The University of Southern California Saturday announced the appointment of Dr. Fred D. Fagg, Jr., dean of the faculty at Northwestern University, Evanston, Ill., as president of U.S.C. Dr. Fagg will take office Sept. 1. He will succeed Dr. Rufus H. von KleinSmid, university chancellor and acting president since he retired from the presidency last year.
