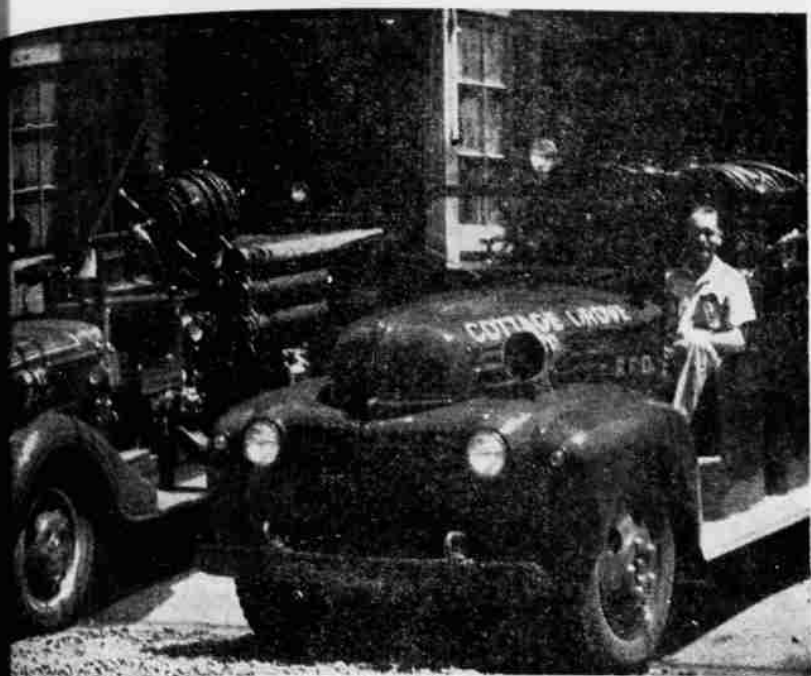

WARMING UP THE MOTOR OF COTTAGE GROVE'S newest fire engine is Theodore Kenas, chief. The new Ford truck will cost about \$9000 when fully equipped and will give Cottage Grove pieces of equipment. It is a high pressure "fog" truck with a 400-gallon tank. The "fog" is a spray of water that smothers a fire more rapidly than under the old system of drenching a blaze with a stream of water. The city plans to install a 500-gallon suction pump in front of the engine. Next to the new truck is Cottage Grove's 16-year-old Ford low pressure pump truck. In a back of the fire station there is a 20-year-old Dodge hose carrier that will be available in emergencies and for training. (Register-Guard photo, Wiltshire engraving.)
