 "Cal has always run the parades before," Wintler said, "and although he's been responsible for some wonderful affairs, he's never had a chance to see any of them."
 Final assignment of the units was made Tuesday evening by the committee and Wintler said that entrants would be notified by mail as to their positions and the points of formation for their particular floats.
 "A few last-minute entries probably will drift in," Wintler said, "but we're well-satisfied with the parade as it stacks up now. It will be one of the biggest and best we've ever had."

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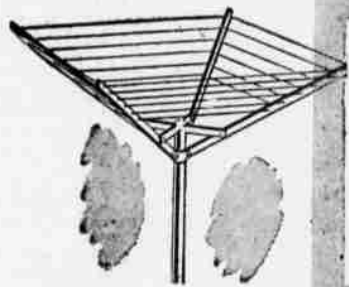

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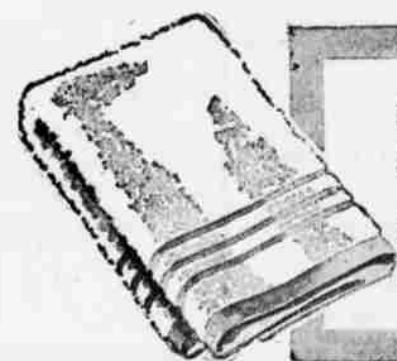
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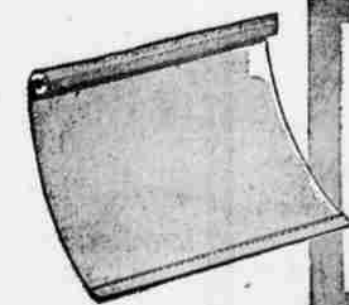
