

Moths Found Common Type

The moths which deluged downtown Eugene Wednesday night are nothing more than a common cutworm type, according to Professor P. L. Risley, head of the department of biology at the University of Oregon.

"It's probably a good thing they stopped downtown where they did and deposited their eggs," the professor pointed out. "If deposited in fertile ground, the cutworms

that hatch could do a lot of damage to plant life." The moth is one of the noctuid family, which contains more than 2500 species, and is so called because of that type come out at night and are attracted by light. This particular species is sometimes called an owl moth as the face resembles that of an owl. As for the large numbers of moths—the professor isn't sure, but he thinks the moths may have been moving up the valley, collecting other moths as they went. At any rate, the performance was not repeated Thursday night, to the delight of Willamette St. merchants.

Chamber of Commerce and others when it was learned that the fire department was unable to draw water from a hydrant on Eighteenth St. recently while fighting a garage blaze.

Pumps Enough Luckily the fire did not have a good start and the booster pumps on the truck were enough to extinguish the blaze.

At the time the Mountain States Power Co. was pumping 3000 gallons of water per minute and pressure gauges registered over 80 pounds, but too many people were irrigating and thus reducing the pressure at many of the fire hydrants.

Adopts Report The council adopted the viewers report on the proposed sewer to extend from Fourteenth St. to the east city limits and it is anticipated that a call for bids on the project will be made early in August. At the suggestion of the city manager, the council passed a resolution to pay the volunteer firemen \$1 each for two drill evenings per month. It was stipulated that the total amount was not to exceed \$10 per drill.

No Change Councilman Gilbert Shoush reported that the health committee had decided that there was no basis for changing the recent trailer ordinance requiring all trailer houses to hook up to a sewer within ten days and to pay certain yearly fees for such city privileges as fire protection.

A group of property owners from Water St. appeared before the council to ask costs of paving Water St. from D to K St. This was the second such group this week.

Property owners from Eighteenth St. asked the council for figures on paving last Monday. Councilman John Boeshans asserted that paving is the cheapest in the long run because it increases property values and saves the taxpayer money because maintenance requirements are less.

Archeological Survey Started at Dam Sites

Philip Drucker, anthropologist from the Smithsonian institution in Washington, D. C., arrived on the University of Oregon campus during the first part of July to direct a survey of archeological sites on the Pacific Coast where dams are to be built.

Though this program is being directed by the Smithsonian, the institution is working in cooperation with the National Park Service, the Bureau of Reclamation, and the Corps of Engineers.

Former City Recorder Can Breathe Easy

Alta King of Cottage Grove, former Eugene city recorder, can breathe easier now. That requisition slip lost from the office files back in 1922 has been found.

City firemen recovered the old requisition slip Friday while preparing to move into a new pump block office on the first floor of the city hall. For King's information, it was behind the drawers of that file cabinet that used to be in the recorder's office. The old-fashioned counter-type cabinet has been in the fire department office for gosh knows how many years.

The slip was made out to Sweet Drain Auto Co. of Eugene, requesting payment of \$18.18 for gasoline and oil charged to the police department. The auto firm was owned by Mahlon Sweet and by the late Rollo Drain. Sweet said Friday he couldn't remember if he got his \$18.18.

The slip was signed by C. B. Christensen, police chief in 1922. According to the slip, the city paid 34 cents a quart for oil in 1922, while the best quality oil now is available for 35 cents. Gasoline actually is cheaper, but the tax is higher.

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Chinese Takes UO Sociology Post

Mrs. Tsao King of Shanghai, China, recently accepted a position as graduate assistant in the sociology department in the University of Oregon. She will start work in September.

A graduate of the University of Shanghai, Mrs. King received her B. A. degree there in 1937. While in China she worked at the Peiping Union Medical College as a

social worker in home and general social worker, and as a worker in the psychiatric department. She also worked in the quarters of the Chinese Relief and Rehabilitation Commission in Shanghai. She has included translation to Chinese and English in her list of 50 articles written by her and British authors in the social sciences as well as literature.
