Bill
The Senate earlier had passed by a voice vote another bill which would increase living allowances to veterans going to school under the GI Bill of Rights. This bill now goes to the House.
The terminal leave bond measure got unanimous House approval at two weeks ago. It would permit

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but not require former enlisted men to cash bonds issued to them starting last year in lieu of cash terminal pay.
The bonds could be turned in for cash at local banks after Sept. 1. Under the present law the maturity date is five years after the date of issue.
The bill also extends for one year beyond Sept. 1 the deadline for application for terminal bonds by veterans.
The Senate deferred action on a bill to increase pay ceilings applicable to the veterans on-the-job training program after Senator Robert A. Taft (R-Ohio) told his colleagues it is "subject to tremendous abuse" and should be "thoroughly studied."
Taft said that, as the program now is set up, "at any time during the next 10 years any one of 15,000,000 veterans may start out to learn some new occupation and put himself on the roll to draw cash from Uncle Sam."
The measure adjusting benefits to veterans attending school would increase subsistence grants from the present \$65 a month to \$75 in the case of single veterans, from \$90 to \$105 for married veterans without children, and from \$90 to \$120 for those who have children.

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Reconstruction Big U. N. Puzzle

LAKE SUCCESS, N. Y. — (UP) — The United Nations Economic and Social Council opened the most important session of its brief career Saturday with a warning from eastern Europe that it must prove itself or retire to the sidelines in world affairs.
The main issue as the council plunged into a five-week meeting was whether it could survive the east-west split over the economic reconstruction of Europe and play its part as one of the three main gears in the U.N.'s peace-making machinery.

Lumber Waits S.P. Embargo
PORTLAND — (AP) — Lumber industry spokesmen warned any prolonged strike of engineers on the Southern Pacific railroad would shut down mills and plywood plants in Oregon.
Plywood industry spokesmen here said the strike action would almost automatically close plywood mills in Eugene, Willamina, Lebanon, Sweet Home, Coos Bay and Myrtle Creek.
Waterfront spokesman said deliveries of lumber to Portland docks would be handicapped.
Meanwhile, shippers of other commodities in the Portland area announced an alternate shipping route had been worked out with six other railroads which would permit service between California and Portland.
The route would require use of tracks of six railroads, owned by the Santa Fe, Western Pacific, Great Northern, Southern Pacific, and the Spokane, Portland and Seattle railroads.
G. H. Hartwell, Santa Fe agent in Portland, said his line had "lots of cars" available and that many shippers already had made arrangements to have Santa Fe move the goods if the strike is called.
Southern Pacific normally handles all rail goods between here and California.

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Interior Funds' Fate Hinges on Final Vote
WASHINGTON — (UP) — The Interior Department will get \$194,500,000 for the current fiscal year if the House and Senate ratify an agreement reached Saturday by a conference committee.
The big agency, which spends most of its funds on irrigation, reclamation and power projects in the west, would have gotten \$215,000,000 under the original Senate appropriation bill. The House had allowed the department \$161,000,000. President Truman had asked \$295,420,420.
There was no immediate indication of when a final vote would be taken.

Migrant combine grain harvesters travel annually about 1600 miles from San Antonio, Tex., to the Winnipeg area in Canada.

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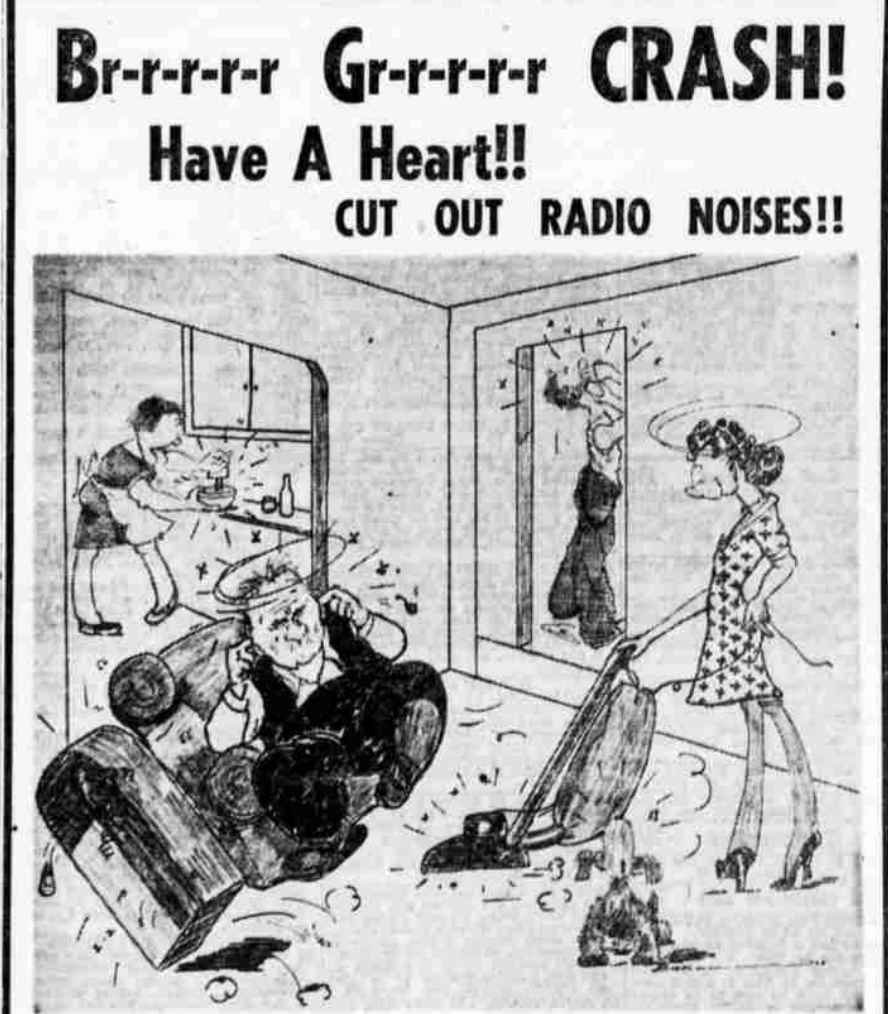
