

Pasco Officers Hit in Battle

PASCO, Wash. — (AP) — Two men were being held here Monday in connection with a pre-dawn Sunday shooting scrape that resulted in hospitalization of one officer and wounding of a second.

Each of the two officers, Police-man Arden Palmer and Sheriff Harvee Huston, was struck by two bullets. Palmer, paralyzed by a bullet which shattered his thigh, also was struck in the right arm. Huston was hit on the left hand and left shoulder, but declined hospitalization.

The shooting occurred as the officers investigated a housewife's report that two men had entered the Navy Homes Administration building.

Police Chief Alfred L. McKibbin said the arrests were made after Huston assertedly recognized the voice of one assailant.

A large quantity of property, including tires, cameras, radios, clocks and machine tools, were found and impounded for investigation, McKibbin said.

7 Oregonians Lost in War Are Identified

AUBURN, Wash. — (AP) — Positive identification has been made of 204 American unknown soldiers, seven from Oregon and six from Idaho and Washington, who died in the Philippine Islands while confined in a Japanese prisoner of war camp, Lt. Col. Vernon L. Lewis announced Saturday.

Colonel Lewis, chief of the American Graves Registration division here, said all were first buried in the Camp O'Donnell prisoner of war cemetery on Luzon and have now been disinterred and reburied in the United States armed forces cemetery Manila, No. 2, within the city limits of Manila. The next of kin were notified.

The Oregon men were: Oregon—Pvt. Robert W. King, McMinnville; Sgt. Robert E. Landry, Winchester Bay; 2d Lt. Leon H. McCauley, Roseburg; Pvt. Robert C. Prager, Astoria; 2d Lt. John P. Sevcik, Klamath Falls; Pvt. Ralph L. Smith, Yamhill; and Pvt. Alred L. West, Portland.

The 67-year-old Stalin, who was dressed in a military uniform, appeared to be in good health and high spirits when he entered his special box and received the cheers of an audience of 70,000 which crowded the stadium to capacity. He was accompanied by Marshal Klement Voroshilov and Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov.

Navy Repair Work Boon for Astoria

ASTORIA — (AP) — Establishment of a ship repair program at Tongue Point naval station, which will mean a \$2,000,000 payroll and work for 100 to 150 civilians here, has been authorized by the Navy.

Capt. S. P. Jenkins, commanding officer of the Columbia River group of the Pacific Reserve fleet, said the base would also boost naval personnel here.

Capt. Jenkins said commercial contract work would maintain the fleet of 450 vessels tied up here and first call for bids will be made in about 60 days. He said the program would be in full operation in six or eight months.
