Makes 4 Lives

Over a 200-foot embankment. Police reported the accident was discovered eight hours after the plunge when Mrs. Victor Frye struggled from the wreckage and reached the road as George and Wesley Clark, Powers, drove past the scene on the lonely route.

Listed as dead were Mrs. Edna Frye, 57; her son, Cecil, 29; daughter, Geraldine, 14, and nephew, James Daniel Frye, 28. Injured were Mr. and Mrs. Victor Frye and their one-year-old daughter, Florence Edna. All are from Agness.

Mrs. Frye reported the accident occurred about 1:30 a. m. Sunday. The Clarks arrived on the scene at 9:00 a. m.

Fire suppression crews from China Flat came to help bring the dead and injured up the rugged cliff: a difficult process, which took until 3:30 p. m. Sunday.

ENGINEERS MAKE \$20 to \$30 A DAY WITHOUT OVERTIME ON TYPICAL MAIN LINE RUNS

Seeking to Mislead Public About the Railroad's Long Established Good Practices, The Brotherhood Defies U.S. Law and the President of the United States.

Defying President Truman and the U.S. Law, the engineers' Brotherhood continues its great threat to the welfare of the West, despite further concessions by Southern Pacific.

The Brotherhood continues its attempts to mislead the public about how much engineers are paid and about good welfare practices long established by Southern Pacific in an effort to confuse the basic issues. Here are the facts:

Here's What They Say They Want!
Minimum Pay of \$12.95 Per Day.

But Here's What They Already Get
From \$20 to \$30 per day in typical cases, often for less than eight hours work. Examples: Engineers on the "Daylights" between San Francisco and San Luis Obispo get \$27.97 for a run of 248 miles, with only about six hours on-duty time; on the "Sunset" and "Golden State" between Los Angeles and Yuma (251 miles) they get \$29.44 for about seven hours on-duty time. Between Gerber and Dunsmuir, freight engineers are paid for 104 miles (although the actual distance is only 100.5 miles) getting at least \$21.71 for about seven hours on duty. On through freight runs between Roseville and Sparks, Nevada, they are paid for 159 miles (although the actual distance is only 139 miles) receiving at least \$23.89 for about eleven hours on duty.

The basis of engineers' pay scales, where 100 miles may constitute a day's work, is involved and technical and difficult to explain briefly, but the above examples clearly show that the Brotherhood's constant references to a \$10.02 minimum wage are designed to make you believe that engineers are paid far less than they are.

Southern Pacific furnishes the finest type of cushioned seats for locomotive cabs—and always has. Respirators, too, are furnished for use by engine crews in passing through tunnels.

Engines are cleaned by roundhouse workers. Engine crews have not turned a hand to such labor for more than 30 years. The emergency board appointed by President Roosevelt ruled in 1945 that such items have no place in the working agreements.

In our effort to do everything we can to avoid the strike and consequent great loss to Western agriculture and business, Southern Pacific has offered further concessions to the Brotherhood, going beyond the recommendations of the first emergency board appointed by President Roosevelt, but the Brotherhood remains obdurate. Their attitude is "All or Else."

There has been no delay on Southern Pacific's part in negotiations between the Company and the Brotherhood. We have been ready at all times to meet with the Brotherhood and to make every reasonable effort to reach a settlement fair to both sides and to the public.

The law provides that when an Emergency Board is created, as President Truman has done in this case, there shall be no strike for 60 days thereafter. The law provides that there shall be no strike during the 30 days the Board has to investigate and make its findings and recommendations nor for 30 days thereafter. Yet the Brotherhood threatens a strike regardless.

To review: The Brotherhood called a strike to enforce compliance with 20 demands that the highest tribunal under U.S. railroad labor law passed upon in 1945. Southern Pacific accepted this tribunal's recommendations in their entirety, although we did not agree by any means with all of them.

The Brotherhood rejected the report and placed the same 20 issues on a strike ballot, the strike call resulting. The Brotherhood announced it would go ahead with the strike despite the creation of a new Emergency Board by President Truman, which, under the law, as we have stated, should delay the strike at least 60 days, if the engineers would observe the law.

The individual relationships throughout the railroad between officers and employes are cordial, with mutual respect, and the management seeks to maintain such relationships in this case by its efforts for fair settlement in the public interest.
