Barley, Potato Loan Rates Told

Government loan rates on 1947 crop barley for Lane County were set at \$1.11, the Commodity Credit Corp. told the Associated Press at Portland Tuesday. Linn and Benton County rates will be \$1.12.

Support prices for 1947 late crop potatoes were listed by the state committee of the U. S. Production and Marketing Administration at 40 to 80 cents a bushel higher than last year. Rates for the Lane County area for U. S. No. 1 grade, FOB cars, are: September, \$2.40; October, \$2.50; November, \$2.70; December, \$2.90; and January, \$3.10. Rates for Malheur, Baker, Walla and Union Counties are 20 cents a bushel lower.

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Rains Cause Inconvenience, But Labor Camp Goes Ahead

COBURG — "Digging out" from under Lane County's heaviest July rain since 1916, farm laborers at the Coburg farm labor camp here were preparing Tuesday to turn out full force in the bean fields in an effort to save the crop, some of which threatens to grow "out of grade" if it is not picked soon.

The camp is under the supervision of H. H. Plambeck and provides tent quarters for migrant workers during picking seasons. It opened Friday and by Monday had 150 inhabitants with 300 persons expected as soon as additional tents are erected. The camp is conducted on a cooperative basis between the Coburg Farm Labor Committee, headed by Stuart Hurd, and the Oregon State College Extension Service.

After heavy rains Saturday and Sunday which nearly flooded the camp, workers were busy Monday draining low ground. However, Plambeck said, a number reported to the fields for work.

For Children

Tuesday about 30 children in the camp were being organized for daytime recreation activities by representatives of the Home Mission Council of North America and the Oregon Council of Churches, who care for the children while their parents are working.

Activities of the child care group include story hours, games, song periods, evening programs for the young people and adults, Sunday church and Sunday school.
