All farm labor offices in Oregon, including the one at Eugene, will be returned to the state employment service next December 31, T. Morris Dunne, State Unemployment Compensation Commission chairman, announced from Salem Wednesday.

Job placement of farm workers now is handled through local farm labor offices under supervision of the U. S. Agriculture Department.

Farm Labor Assistant Kenneth Arney at Eugene confirmed the United Press report from Salem.

saying Congress had adjourned without making permanent appropriations for farm labor offices. Farm employment service was taken from the state by the federal government five years ago. No changes are expected in office personnel here until the end of the year with exception of Winfield Atkinson, employed for the summer only. Mrs. Ruby Jenkins is Arney's only full-time assistant.

Red-Hunter Predicts Lurid Star Testimony

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The investigation of Communism in Hollywood, scheduled by the House Committee on Un-American Activities to begin Sept. 23, got advance billing Wednesday as stupendous and colossal.

Almost, that is.

"It will be sensational," Rep. Nixon (R-Calif.) predicted.

A member of the committee, Nixon told reporters:

"We intend to name names and to produce witnesses who will testify they have seen some persons prominent in Hollywood at Communist meetings and who will report what they said."

Just how many first dimension stars will be brought into the hearings is not yet certain. Nixon said he thinks most big name stars who may figure in the inquiry will be listed as tinged with pink rather than as bright red Communists.

The key figures in the Communist movement in Hollywood are not well known nationally, Nixon said, but are important in the movie industry.

The Californian indicated a personal view that the committee might accomplish more by training its fire on the Communists in the government, education, labor and other fields. But he said the Hollywood inquiry should be of value in giving the movie capital a dose of preventive medicine.

Vito Marcantonio Fails To Secure Nomination

NEW YORK—(AP)—U. S. Rep. Vito Marcantonio, of the American Labor Party, failed Tuesday to elect a majority of the members of the Democratic County Committee in Manhattan's 18th Congressional District which he needs for that party's designation in the next election.

Two candidates he backed for Democratic Assembly district leadership in Tuesday's primary were defeated.

Under a recent state law the Democratic County Committee must authorize the Democratic congressional standard bearer in the district.

Schrenk sent letters to Sens. Wayne L. Morse and Guy Cordon and Rep. Harris Ellsworth, asking their help in holding the line against a proposed 32 per cent slash. Their replies indicated they had jumped in to help.

Although several weeks ago the picture on continued agricultural conservation appropriations was very black, said Schrenk, recent action by Congress, and especially the Senate, has assured the farmer of continued support in Washington on flood control, reclamation and conservation programs. He pointed out that just before adjournment House and Senate conferees compromised on agricultural conservation appropriations and allocated a total of \$265,000,000 for use in completing the 1947 program, a sum about \$40,000,000 short of the funds earmarked for that purpose by the last Congress.

Continued support of agricultural work after 1947 was indicated when \$150,000,000 was earmarked by this joint House-Senate committee for a 1948 farm program, Schrenk said. He also pointed out that word has come from Washington of a permanent, long-time farm program which is in the making.

He said the program, as now set up, leaves the payment rates for conservation practices, as set up in the Lane County Handbook, still applicable. The county committee has decided to approve payments for lime and phosphate at 100 per cent up to the 32 per acre conservation material allowance for the farm and then prorate payments for the other practices on the basis of funds remaining.

Purchase orders for materials, as set up in each farmer's plan, are back in effect for phosphates, said Schrenk, but any bulk lime is being handled on a cash basis as far as possible. Extreme slashes for clerical help in the state office make this policy necessary, he explained.

At Portland, according to the Associated Press, N. C. Donaldson, executive assistant to the state production and marketing committee, said administrative funds were cut 20 per cent. Seven of 23 persons, separated from the staff earlier, have been rehired, he said. The staff now numbers 20 persons, half what it was before June 27. No cuts had been made in the Lane County staff.

MORE BIRTH, FEWER DEATHS

SEATTLE—(AP)—A marked change in Washington state population figures was noted in a report on births and deaths for April, just released. Births showed an increase of 46.5 per cent over a year ago, while deaths dropped off five per cent.

Lane Gets \$182,300 From Highway Fund

The State Department in Salem Wednesday apportioned \$182,300 of state highway funds to Lane County as the first quarter payment under the 1947 law which increased counties' share in the fund from 15.7 to 19 per cent, the Associated Press reported.

The money will be used by Lane County's road department for construction and repair.

Funds distributed on the basis of the number of motor vehicles registered in each county during 1946, represent 19 per cent of all receipts from motor vehicle registration fees, motor vehicle fuel taxes, motor carrier fees, and motor vehicle law violation fines collected during the first six months of 1947.

Lane's first quarter payment is a part of the \$389,900 total which will be apportioned to this county from the state fund before the end of the present fiscal year, County Treasurer Grace Schiska reported.

Lane County, with 34,231 vehicles registered in 1946, was second in the state. Multnomah County (Portland) lead with 146,261 vehicles registered, and received \$778,645 from the highway funds.

Farm labor office said several

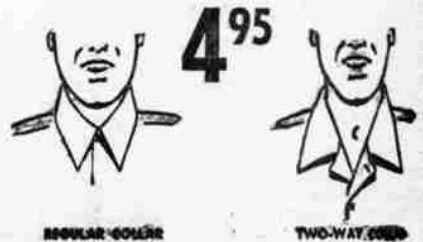
