

KAC Night Power Be Increased

OREGON STATE COLLEGE—
operation of the state
station, KOAC, on 5000 watt
power, in addition to daytime op-
eration, already at that level, has
been granted by the Federal Ra-
dio Commission in approving an
application filed more than a
year ago.

The higher power at night is ex-
pected to improve reception ma-
terially in southern Oregon, in
part of western Oregon not now
served well, and to some extent
in eastern Oregon, says Grant
Hart, chief engineer. The per-
mission for increased power requires
the use of a new directional antenna
to protect stations farther
west on the same wave length.
The station for daytime operation the
same pattern will continue in
the future, which concentrates more out-
ward toward eastern Oregon.
