

Family Food Bills Expected to Stay High Through Winter

WASHINGTON — (UP) — Families were advised Thursday that the family food bill for the winter months of 1947. But a lot of things have happened since then. No Decline.

The same agency now says a decline in food prices is unlikely in the foreseeable future. Here is its price outlook for the fall:

Meat—Not much change, although some slight decline is possible during the period of heavy slaughter in the late fall and early winter.

Eggs, cheese and butter—up seasonally.

Flour—not much change.

Truck crops and fruits—seasonal decline.

Corn—will stay high.

Agriculture experts don't expect seasonal changes to have much effect on prices so long as demand remains high. They pointed out that the period of relative abundance will be followed by a period of reduced supplies, serving to level off prices.

Warm Current Found at Sea

ASTORIA — (AP) — Reports by tuna fishermen that temperature of Pacific waters 100 miles off shore here is 70 degrees brought the explanation from meteorologists Thursday that a tropical current had shifted inshore.

Unon Makey, captain of the troller Starlite, said a reading showed 70 degrees—8 degrees higher than any previous report in that area.

Fishermen said the warm current also explained the large number of tropical species of tuna taken the past week, particularly Bluefin tuna which are found off Central American coast.

Col. E. S. Ellison, senior meteorologist in charge of the Portland weather bureau, said "there is a warm south to north current which now and then moves a little closer inshore. That is evidently what is happening now."

Some fishermen said the warm temperatures might also explain why the albacore, running off shore in large schools, are not biting well.

Nazi Broadcaster To File Appeal

BOSTON — (AP) — Douglas Chandler, 58-year-old former Baltimore newsman, was reported Thursday to be planning an appeal to higher courts after being sentenced to life imprisonment and fined \$10,000 for broadcasting Nazi propaganda in Germany during World War II.

Atty. Claude B. Cross, Chandler's counsel, indicated he might file an appeal to the First U. S. Circuit Court of Appeals and then to the U. S. Supreme Court "if necessary." He has 10 days to file the initial appeal.

Heat Wave Broken In Eastern Region

The summer's first real heat wave was broken in most sections of the nation Thursday, and relief was promised within 24 hours for areas still sweating it out—except for the somewhat too sunny South.

Near the Ohio River temperatures remained high, but the U. S. Weather Bureau said cooler weather should move into the area later Thursday. Temperatures already were considerably cooler in northern Illinois, Indiana and Missouri and all of Iowa, but from those states southward no heat relief was in sight.

The Midwest was promised a continuation of the cool spell for at least another day.

Warm, humid weather working its way through the Eastern States was expected to be replaced by cooler temperatures by Friday, from New England as far south as Virginia.

National Guard Planes To Fly Air Force Day

The Oregon National Guard's 123rd Fighter Squadron will fly over Eugene some time Friday, but local airport authorities and the CAA had not been notified as to the time the flight will reach Eugene.

The flight will start from Portland and continue to Salem and then Eugene, but will not land. It is part of Oregon's observance of Air Force Day.

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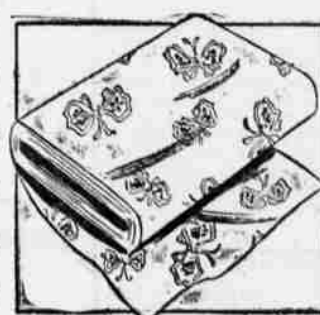
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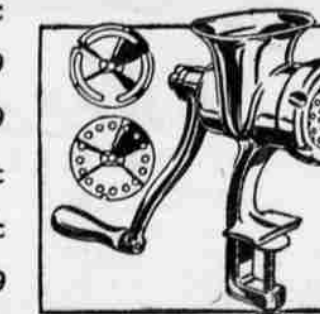
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
