

Three Vets Climb Mt. McKinley In Tough Trek Sans Outside Aid

FAIRBANKS, Alaska — (AP) — Three rugged Ex-G.I. University of Alaska students claimed Friday the swiftest ascent of towering Mount McKinley on record and the first scaling of the highest North American peak for pure adventure since 1932.

The three who made a speedy 17-day trek from Wonder Lake camp to the top of the 29,270-foot peak and return were Gordon Herreid, 22, Santa Maria, Calif.; Frank Mills, 20, Cincinnati; and Henry Daub, 23, Boston.

They were resting at the camp in McKinley National Park after their grueling trip to the mountain top, approximately 42 miles away.

No Support

The party made the climb without receiving any outside support from the air or ground.

Frank T. Been, park superintendent, said the climbers reported reaching the summit July 29. He said the party was the smallest ever to achieve the feat.

Second Scaling

The party was the second to scale the lofty peak this year. The collegians were preceded by the extensively equipped and air-plane-aided Bradford Washburn scientific party in June.

It was the second attempt of the year for Herreid, the leader of the trio. He was a member of a three-collegian party which turned back late in June after one of the

group suffered from altitude sickness at 16,000 feet.

Sick at 18,000

Herreid reported he suffered from the same sickness at 18,000 feet this time, but the trio kept plugging up the final heights in easy stages. They said they carried their own packs.

Since the Alfred Lindley-Harry Liek expedition 15 years ago, all other conquests of the mountain have been by elaborately planned scientific expeditions, aided by airborne supplies and radio communications.

The collegians said they planted a tobacco tin at the top, containing their names and the date. They said they encountered only six inches of new snowfall and a minimum temperature of 20 below zero.

Government to Sell Coos Packing Plant

PORTLAND — (AP) — Notices of the foreclosure sale of Command Packing Co. properties at North Bend were being posted Friday by the U. S. Marshal.

The sale, being directed by the Reconstruction Finance Corp., calls for disposal of the company's personal property at North Bend Aug. 6, and sale of real property at the Coos County courthouse Coquille, Aug. 26.

George Wilbur, RFC attorney handling the case, said the judgment was for \$132,000 in principle and interest loaned the company. Amount of the original loan was \$200,000 but the entire sum never was paid.

Charges Dropped

A complaint against Bill Vance of 1442 Grant St., charging that he shot a dog belonging to G. K. Birch of 1397 Garfield Blvd., was

dismissed in municipal court Friday.

Court Secretary Betty Sether said Birch withdrew his complaint and the court dismissed the case after scheduled witnesses failed to appear in court. The charge against Vance was disorderly conduct.

OSC Battles Housing Lack

OREGON STATE COLLEGE — Adair village, the veteran center eight miles from the OSC campus, will become more of a real city this fall, when in addition to its present population of 326 married vets and families, it will house 300 single men and 30 faculty families. The State Board of Higher Education has recently approved conversion of five of the former hospital buildings into 30 apartments for staff members unable to find other housing in crowded Corvallis.

The college is also conserving

every house it acquires in land for a new athletic plant and purchases for campus expansion the help relieve the desperate faculty housing situation. Two houses from the site of the new physical plant shops are being moved to a new location for use, while all the critical housing situation, administrative officials say.
