Small Cities Told Of State Fund Aid

A "lifeline" for smaller Oregon
 cities hit by sudden population
 growth or unusual problems was
 tossed out by the last session of the
 State Legislature, these towns
 were reminded in the August
 news letter of the League of Ore-
 gon Cities.

The legislature doubled allot-
 ments of state highway revenue
 to cities but, in addition to that,
 set up a special fund of \$250,000
 to aid small cities with unusual
 problems. The news letter stressed
 the fact that this money will
 be apportioned only after appli-
 cations for it have been made.
 The highway department has
 prepared a resolution form and the
 small cities needing help were
 urged to obtain copies of the form
 and to submit their applications
 some time this fall.

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Codling Moth Control Urged

Lane apple and pear growers
 were urged to spray their trees
 this week for codling moth con-
 trol.

B. G. Thompson of the Oregon
 State College extension service
 said that the third cover spray
 should be applied as soon as pos-
 sible since the moths have already
 laid their eggs and hatching has
 been reported in some orchards.

Lead Arsenate
 The recommended spray is
 powdered lead arsenate, used at
 the rate of 3 pounds to 100 gal-
 lons of water. In orchards where
 the moth has not become a ser-
 ious problem, two pounds of the
 powder will usually protect the
 fruit.

Thompson said that calcium
 arsenate in the same proportion as
 lead arsenate is nearly as effec-
 tive against the moth, according
 to state college experiments.

Keep Control
 Information received this week
 by County Agent O. S. Fletcher
 indicated also that growers using
 DDT can make one spray last for
 the season but should not use more
 than one half pound of DDT to 100
 gallons of water.

In using any of the sprays it is
 recommended that particular at-
 tention be given to the upper por-
 tions of the trees where the moths
 have been found to lay most of
 their eggs.
 Sufficient spray should be ap-
 plied to cover each apple or pear
 because the moth larva will at-
 tack any unprotected surface.
