Sugar Price Boost Okayed

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Your grocer can boost the price of sugar one cent per five-pound bag—as soon as he sells the sugar he had on hand Tuesday and get his new supplies.

The price of sugar, only food-basket item still under price control, was hiked Tuesday to keep the U.S. government from losing money on its "middle-man" sugar dealings with Cuba.

The government's contract for purchase of Cuban sugar contains an "escalator clause," based on U.S. price indexes. The indexes went up, so the U.S. government hiked its prices to refineries and let them charge more. Government authority to control sugar prices expires Oct. 31.

Mattson Rejects Transfer Orders

son's ability or performance, and pointed out that the transfer is to an office of equal rating with the Eugene office. He said the rating of the Coos Bay office was raised so that the transfer could be made to an office of equal rating and salary.

The transfer has been scheduled to take effect Aug. 18, with Mattson directed to go to Coos Bay Aug. 11 to familiarize himself with the office.

Guy Lang, who has been field supervisor in eastern Oregon in recent months, has been transferred to the Eugene management with instructions to take over Aug. 11.

Mattson said he had requested a hearing before the State Civil Service Commission but that this had been denied. A letter from the commission signed by Robert R. Johnson, director, said the proposed transfer does not appear to violate civil service rules. However, Mattson said Wednesday, he is refusing to accept the transfer.

When he accepted the Eugene position, said Mattson, he gave up a permanent civil service job at Seattle at a larger salary in order to live at home, and was assured by two officials of the employment service that the position would be permanent.

Gaiser points out, however, that the employment service was then administered by the federal government, whereas it is now administered by the state, and that the state cannot be bound by commitments of another administration.

Reductions
In explaining the transfer Gaiser said that the commission had decided to reduce the number of field supervisors from seven to four, with each supervisor handling both unemployment compensation and employment service matters, and that Mattson's transfer was connected with carrying out this integration program.

The Coos Bay office became vacant when Joe Wilson was transferred to Salem as a supervisor. Lang, who had been a supervisor in eastern Oregon, was transferred to Eugene and Mattson to Coos Bay. This series of moves, however, is not related to reduction in the number of supervisors, Gaiser said, with the transfer of Wilson being made because a death in the Portland office required transfer of a Salem supervisor there.

Wilson has been in the service since 1941 and Lang since 1937. Mattson entered it in 1945, thus having less seniority than either.

Seniority Right
Gaiser said that Lang was not sent to the Coos Bay position because he has a preference for Eugene and his seniority gave him a right to express a preference.

In regard to the "bumping" charge, he said: "In principle we don't like 'bumping,' and there is little of it. When it comes to specific cases the question of seniority

Cites UN Experience - - -

'Ike' Tours Alaska, Speaks of Defense

FAIRBANKS, Alaska — (AP) — Americans must be "firm and patient, keep their sense of humor — and keep their powder dry," General Dwight D. Eisenhower said Tuesday in a radio broadcast over an Alaskan network.

The first U. S. army chief of staff to view the continent's northernmost bastions of defense, Eisenhower said the United States must maintain a powerful military establishment, with emphasis on an aerial arm.

"Ours is only one of many philosophies of life," he said. "We have no objection to others living under dictatorships if that is what they want. But when others of unlike philosophies announce that our form of life is antagonistic to their future, we must look to our own strength."

Only One Indication
"No nation went into the United Nations organization with warmer purposes than ours. What we see happening at this date is only an indication of the circle of threatening potentialities," he added.

At a news conference later, the general said the apparent abandonment of Aleutian bases is in effect not an abandonment at all but a "contraction and concentration of military potential in accordance with available cash and manpower."

The framework of strategic bases is being kept intact for rapid expansion if necessary, he said.

Lauds Men
Of Alaskan bases he has viewed thus far on his tour of inspection, Eisenhower said he was dissatisfied with housing equipment but was proud of the job Army men assigned to Alaska have done in their approach to problems.

purchases and a \$20,000,000 cut in "luxury" imports.

Attlee said flatly that Britain "cannot and will not base our plans on the assumption that there may be further American help toward the recovery of the old world."

Loan Exhausted
Attlee told the commons that the American loan had been designed to buy time for Britain and the old world to get back on their feet economically but admitted that a 40 per cent boost in import prices was exhausting the loan nearly two years ahead of time.

However, he added that the world dollar shortage would have arisen earlier had it not been for UNRRA and American loans to countries in addition to Britain.

"Britain cannot and will not base our plans on the assumption that there may be further American help toward the recovery of the old world," Attlee said.

Attlee took exception to charges by Winston Churchill that the government had "frittered away" the U. S. loan.

Turning early to the attack Churchill made on the government Monday, Attlee said his charge that the U. S. loan had been frittered away "will have repercussions which might do harm to this country."

"Mr. Churchill suggested that we had frittered away the loan," he said. "I will proceed to show that this is not true. I want to give the house and country as full and fair a description of our position as I can."

Attlee's statement was a direct response to the attack of Oliver Stanley who led off debate for the conservative with a demand for a "precise statement as to the amount of our dollar losses attributable to all various causes."

\$1,000,000 FIRE
