Alameda, Calif.

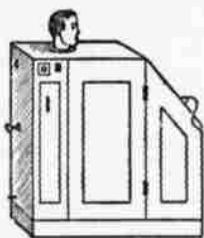

Corn Prices Reach New All-Time High

CHICAGO—(U.S.)—Corn hit re-
cord prices in Board of Trade deal-
ings Friday, with September fu-
tures gaining their third all-time
high within a week and cash corn
also reaching a record level.

Following the lead of the fu-
tures trading, cash corn sold at
\$2.38 a bushel, two cents higher
than the previous record of World
War I years, \$2.36 a bushel paid
in August, 1917.

Other grains likewise moved up
a cent or more a bushel.
