

Ocean Mishaps Take 3 Lives

COOS BAY, Ore. — (AP) — A passenger of a light plane that landed on the beach north of here drowned in the surf Sunday while attempting to swim to an overturned boat in which Coast Guardsmen later discovered the body of a fisherman.

The Coast Guard station at Coos Head reported the passenger, Pearl E. Wasson, 35, Lebanon, had earlier attempted to investigate the boat wreckage. Failing to swim through the breakers, he and Pilot Frank Brownlee flew to a North Bend airport and obtained an oil can and rope. With that Wasson again attempted to float to the boat, but disappeared in the surf.

The Coast Guard recovered Wasson's body. In the boat to which he was swimming, the Coast Guard discovered the body of Roy Pierson, 52, Gardiner. Pierson's head and neck had caught in a fanbelt.

Coroner Brewer Mills said an autopsy would be made on the fisherman to determine whether he was strangled by the belt before the boat capsized or was

drowned. He said the man apparently had been working on the engine.

DE LAKE — (AP) — Companions of Clarence P. Suratt, 42, Portland, missing since early Saturday in the surf at Lincoln Beach, were quoted Monday as reporting the last they saw of Suratt was the flicker of a flashlight he held when swept to sea.

Tom Booker, 23, and a brother, Marvin, 21, told of struggling to hold Suratt when a heavy swell struck them. They were chipping truck worms for fishing bait from rocks at low tide. Suratt disappeared about 3:00 a.m. Saturday.

The widow, two sons and two daughters survive.

Council Plans Busy Session

The city council will meet at 8 p. m. Monday in the city hall to hear a full agenda of proposed ordinances and set a date for a public hearing on the new 50-page, comprehensive re-zoning plan for the city.

Among ordinances due for readings are assessments for sidewalks on Taylor St. between Third and Fourth Aves., Van Buren St. between Twelfth and Thirteenth Aves., Twelfth Ave. between Polk and Taylor Sts., and Thirteenth Ave. between Monroe and Almaden Sts.

Other ordinances coming before the council will deal with the sale of firearms, regulation of private detectives, licensing of a punch board, and the calling of a special election to decide on proposals for the annexation of the Inavale-City Outlook addition.

Legislators Put On Blacklist

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The CIO has marked for defeat next year at least 340 members of the House and 28 of the 32 Senators up for re-election.

The CIO said it would try to defeat those marked because of their voting records in the last session of Congress.

CIO President Philip Murray urged the 6,000,000 of his federation to "sweep out of office" (in 1948) the Congressmen and Senators who voted against the people, and make the 81st Congress one of which the nation can be proud.

Vote Records Tested

The voting records and Murray's appeal were carried in a special supplement to the CIO News. It was the third time that Murray has published election appeals in an attempt to obtain a court test of the Taft-Hartley law's prohibition on expenditure of union funds in connection with any federal election. The justice department is still studying the matter but has not yet started any actions.

The CIO selected 10 domestic issues on which the Senators voted and 12 voted on by House members. It marked members of both Houses "right" or "wrong" in the view of the CIO.

In the Senate, "wrong" votes from the CIO standpoint were those for the original Taft-Hartley bill, the conference version of the same bill and for its passage over President Truman's veto; for the portal pay law, for the "voluntary" 15 per cent rent increase, for passage of the second tax bill over Truman's veto, for the Reed-Bulwinkle bill to exempt railroads from anti-trust suits, for seating Sen. Theodore Bilbo, (D-Miss.), and against confirmation of David E. Lilienthal as Atomic Energy Commission chairman, and against increasing veterans' on-the-job training pay.

Brewster Gets Zero — On the basis, eight republicans, including Sens. John V. Bricker of Ohio and Owen Brewster of Maine, were scored "zero" by the CIO.

In the House, 92 members voted as the CIO thought they should on 50 per cent of the issues and 340 voted "right less than half of the time." House members were judged on 12 issues, three of them votes on the Taft-Hartley labor law. Twenty-eight house democrats and Vito Marcantonio, American Labor Party, made a "perfect" CIO score and 15 Republicans who were rated "zero."

Reynolds Cuts Prices On Building Materials

NEW YORK — (AP) — A 20 per cent reduction in the price of aluminum building materials was announced Monday by the Reynolds Metals Co.

President R. S. Reynolds said increased demand and production enabled his firm to reduce prices on aluminum shingles, clapboard siding, snap-seal roofing and ceiling panels.

Truman Ranks High In Rejection of Bills

WASHINGTON — (AP) — President Truman, with 92 vetoes, has moved into the top ranks of chief executives who have registered their disapproval of congressional bills, a survey showed Monday.

Mr. Truman's total—60 in the 79th Congress and 32 in the 80th—puts him in a tie with President Grant on the list of prolific presidential "vetoers."

But he still has a long way to go before he can come near the States, the FEC, and the Inter-records set by President Franklin D. Roosevelt and Grover Cleveland.

In his 12 years in office, Mr. Roosevelt vetoed 631 measures, Cleveland 475. FDR was over-riden nine times, Cleveland seven times.

Chaos Termed Russia's Goal

SPOKANE, Wash. — (AP) — America needs to face the fact that Russia wants world chaos and will continue to sabotage American efforts to promote postwar recovery in the world. Eric Johnston, president of the Motion Picture Assn., said here Monday.

Returning to his Spokane home after a tour through 11 European countries, Johnston declared, "If we face up to the facts of life, understand them and approach them realistically, our chances of getting through the danger period will substantially improve."

Getting the world back on its feet will cost a lot of money, he said, "but it will cost us much more not to promote recovery. We're in this show up to our necks. We're simply in a spot where our necks are involved if the other fellow's neck is put in the guillotine."

Johnston planned to remain here with his family for two or three weeks.

Federal Civil Service Examinations Listed

The Federal Civil Service announced Monday examinations for appointment to the positions of field examiner, \$3773 a year, and for positions in the recreational activities field, \$1954 to \$4902 a year.

Persons who desire permanent positions will have an opportunity to file for a Civil Service examination leading to probational appointment with permanent classified Civil Service status in these positions in the Veterans Administration in Idaho, Montana, Oregon and Washington.

Entertainment Expenses Are Legal Deductions—Sometimes

WASHINGTON — (AP) — You, too, can sometimes deduct the cost of parties, liquor and presents for girls from your income tax. But—

A Bureau of Internal Revenue official warned Monday that the government must be convinced that your entertainment deductions were "ordinary and necessary" expenses of doing business.

The law under which Howard Hughes claimed deductions for his entertainment spending is that simple—"ordinary and necessary."

However, the government applies a strict interpretation. The expense must be both ordinary and necessary, and the type of business, its customs and the size of the expenditure make a lot of difference.

"It all depends upon the circumstances," the bureau said.

Income tax returns are confidential. They are open only to state tax officials, congressional committees dealing with taxation and to other committees which can get an executive order from the President giving them access to the records.

Individuals Must List

Both individuals and corporations can claim entertainment deductions which come under the head of business expenses. Individuals must make an itemized return, however, whereas corporations can list entertainment as a lump sum—until it is chal-
