State's X-ray To Visit Lane

Mrs. Leda H. Smith, executive secretary of the Lane County Health Assn., said Wednesday that the state's large mobile X-ray unit would be in Eugene at fair time (Sept. 24, 25, 26) to check adults from Eastern and Central Lane County.

The unit is to be in Florence for Western Lane residents next spring, Mrs. Smith said.

Special emphasis this year will be made on the drive to x-ray persons over 15 years of age. Food handlers are required by law to take the x-ray and anyone else who wants to may take advantage of the three-day stand in Eugene. The health association is making out a schedule for additional times and places this fall and will release full details later, Mrs. Smith announced.

Guilty Plea Planned In Atom Secrets' Case

PITTSBURGH, (AP)—U. S. Attorney Owen M. Burns said Wednesday that Alexander von der Luft, 23-year-old ex-army sergeant charged with taking atomic bomb documents, would enter a plea of guilty Thursday, Aug. 21, here before Federal District Judge Robert M. Bibson.

Vonderlier Luft, husky bespectacled Princeton University student of nearby Mt. Lebanon, is charged with stealing and concealing government documents. The maximum penalty on the two counts is 37 years imprisonment, a \$7,000 fine or both.

The former sergeant has said the papers he brought home from the Los Alamos, N. M., bomb project had only "souvenir" value.

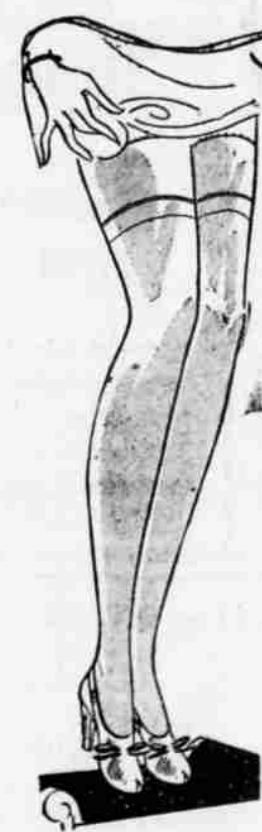
