Sweltering Midwest Receives First Hint of Heat Relief

Cooler air and scattered showers started moving into the nation's scorched cornbelt Wednesday, hinting at the first relief in nearly four weeks from a drought which has damaged millions of bushels of corn.

The U. S. Weather Bureau at Chicago reported that cooler weather and some rain had moved into most of Nebraska, and was expected to move into Iowa and sections of Illinois and Indiana Thursday and Friday.

The forecast said that the rains would not be as heavy as the thirsty crops need, but that they would bring some relief to drying fields.

Early Wednesday and Tuesday night, many parts of the country had general showers, which helped to relieve sufferers from the late summer heat.

In Nebraska, temperatures Wednesday ran about 10 degrees lower than Tuesday, when they hit the high 90's. Temperatures still were in the 90's in Iowa, Indiana and Illinois—the other principal corn states—but were expected to drop later this week.

State and federal crop statisticians said even with rain and cooler weather Nebraska will be lucky to have even a "fair" corn crop. At least 10 per cent of the late corn has a chance to survive, the statisticians said.

At Indianapolis, the weather bureau said even if showers come to Indiana this weekend, as predicted, they will do little to ease the widespread crop damage.

The Illinois crop reporting service said heat and drought have

cut Illinois corn prospects by at least 9,000,000 bushels. Showers are needed immediately to stop the destruction, the service said.

At Detroit, meanwhile, key body plant workers left their jobs at the Hudson Motor Car Co. because of the heat. They idled 8000 production workers. More than 7000 Chrysler Corp. employees were idle in a similar walkout Tuesday.
