Willamette Forest Road Work To Do Most for Lumber-Takers

The Willamette National Forest tops the list of 19 national forests in Oregon and Washington for the amount of road construction which will result in opening up new timber-cutting areas during 1947-1948.
 One-seventh of the total cut which will be added in the 19 forests as a result of these new timber access roads will be cut along the 22 miles of new road in the Willamette Forest, according to Supervisor J. R. Bruckart.
Access Road
 Location "and right-of-way work on the Blue River access road are 'just about wound up,' according to Bruckart. The eight-mile road runs from the McKenzie Highway to Lookout Creek, and up Lookout Creek to the junction of McKee and Mack Creeks. The construction contracts will be let this fall.
 Extension of the present Fall Creek access road accounts for the last two-plus miles of new road. The original Fall Creek road ran eight or nine miles, and construction crews are now putting finishing touches on the extension. Contractors are working on the bridges and the whole road will be ready for use this fall, Bruckart said.
 A total of 780,000,000 feet of timber will be added to the total cut in all 19 national forests in the two states, and access roads built since 1946 when the special program began will total 244 miles.

'Dust Bowl' Fears Return

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The spectre of another dust bowl in the Great Plains states is being raised by get-rich-quick speculators sowing wheat in previously uncultivated soil in hope of cashing in on the world need.
 The speculators are frankly gamblers. The Agriculture Department said Monday many had never farmed previously. They're gambling on getting two or three crops to be sold at lucrative prices before drought hits the area.
 The Agriculture Department said that more than 1,300,000 acres of virgin soil in this western belt were plowed up during the last year.
 Most of the land should never have been put into wheat, the department's soil conservation service said. It is too dry for profitable farming every year. And once plowed, the land offers a danger of new dust storms—similar to those of the 1930's—until it again is covered with grass.
 "A Kansas City dentist, a Texas oil man, an Oklahoma farmer"—these men are the men described by the soil conservation service as typical of the ones buying land just west of the Oklahoma-Texas panhandle district.
 Many are absentee landlords. Few probably plan to live on the land. Some may never see it. They hire contractors to plant the seed in the fall and to harvest the grain in early summer.
 Conservation officials say there is no doubt that droughts again will come to the great plains. Nobody knows when. The earliest date for a possible start of a new dust bowl is the spring of 1949, officials say.

Bricker's Assailant Found to Be Insane

WASHINGTON — (AP) — A former capitol policeman who fired two shots at Sen. John W. Bricker (R-O) last month in the Senate subway was found insane Monday by a district court lunacy jury.
 William L. Kaiser, 49, who recently had been discharged from the capitol police force, followed Bricker into the subway on July 12 and shot at him with a .22 calibre pistol.
 Both shots missed Bricker, and Kaiser was overpowered by capitol police.

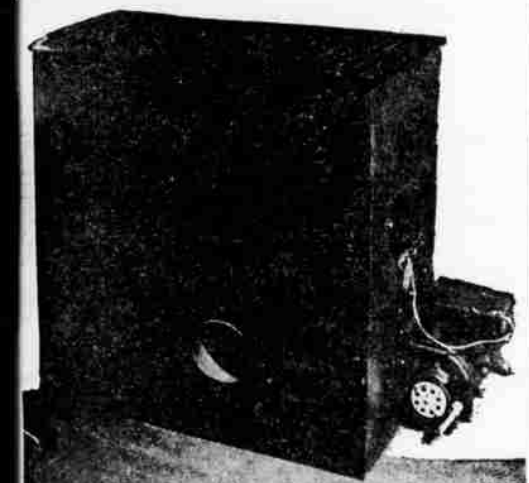
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
