

Hospitals Get New Buildings

SALEM — (U.P.) — Nearly \$1,500,000 worth of construction at Oregon's crowded mental institutions here had the green light Wednesday.

The go-ahead signal, given at a joint session of the State Board

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of Control and Emergency Board here Tuesday, authorized erection of a 300-bed, \$732,321 patients' ward and a 100-person, \$355,800 nurses' dormitory at Oregon State Hospital for the Insane; and a \$256,670 patients' building and \$115,530 laundry at Fairview Home, institution for the feeble-minded.

Projects for both institutions were approved by identical 8-2 votes.

The Fairview work was authorized with the understanding that the Emergency Board would approve a "reasonable" bid for an employees' dormitory there half the size of one previously recommended by the Board of Control.

After Many Tries The "gentlemen's agreement" was made after the Emergency Board threw out, for the fourth time, the control board's request for a three-structure project—including a full-sized employees' building—at the feeble-minded home.

The Board of Control said it would call for bids immediately for the half-sized, court type em-

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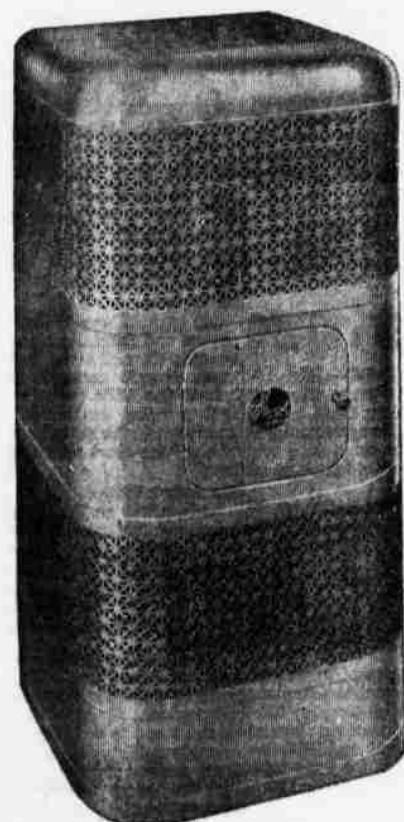
