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Eugene Sales Tops in Cash

The Eugene district office for the Oregon and California Revested Lands Administration topped all districts in Oregon in receipts for timber sold during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1947. Otto C. Krueger, district forester, announced Wednesday.

Although the Roseburg district recorded the largest sale volume, it was only third in money received for timber sales. Salem district was second in amount of timber sold and second in receipts. Eugene, with the highest receipts, was third in timber board footage sold.

For sale of 94,620,000 board feet, the Eugene district took in \$714,978.43; for 98,708,000 board feet, the Salem district chalked up \$697,516.85; for sale of 102,325,000 board feet, Roseburg received \$699,327.41. Medford and Coos Bay districts reported \$676,828.75 and \$387,871.35, respectively, for sale of 93,544,000 and 61,707,000 board feet.
