the stores. The white inner skins of oranges and lemons supply pectin. They should be trimmed and cut in small pieces and dried; if not used at once. Then soak overnight and cook slowly three or four hours and drain. Add the liquid to fruit juice which is lacking in pectin.

Should you wish to test your fruit juice, heat it and before adding the sugar take a small quantity out and add an equal amount of ethyl or grain alcohol. If a sufficient amount of pectin is present a thick, jelly-like mass, which may be gathered upon a spoon will form in the liquid.
