Municipal Judge K. R. Gile fined Snodgrass \$200 and suspended his operator's license for one year. Snodgrass had pleaded not guilty to the charges in a previous hearing.

Percy Brown will lead a second group of Obsidians on a 16-mile hike over the Linton Creek Way Sunday, and persons making the trip may either camp all night at Frog Camp or leave Eugene at 5:30 a.m. Sunday. Preference should be indicated on the sign-up sheet at Hendershott's, where all hikers must register for the trips.

The ten-hour hike over Linton Creek Way will begin at 7:30 a.m. from Frog Camp, and will be by way of the Obsidian trail to Lane Plateau, Linton Meadows, down Linton Creek to Linton Lake and finally to Alder Springs.

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Snodgrass was weaving back and forth across the yellow line on Main St. last July 13 before he was arrested. Snodgrass admitted that he had previously had four beers but contended that his actions were caused by "a physical condition resulting from ulcers."

The defense introduced an affidavit signed by Snodgrass' doctor stating that Snodgrass had been under the doctor's care for more than a month previous to the arrest. The affidavit also had a sentence which said an "unusual reaction" could be caused by a "modest" amount of alcohol.

Lapses Said Seen

Barney Miller, who works with Snodgrass, testified that he had seen Snodgrass lapse into unconsciousness from his ailment on a previous occasion.

Herman Hendershott, defense attorney, said his client was influenced by ulcers and not alcohol.

City Attorney Bill Fort contended that the four beers put Snodgrass under the influence of liquor and pointed out the sentence in the doctor's affidavit saying a modest amount of alcohol might cause a serious reaction.
