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Betty Grable's Salary Tops Among Movie Stars; Treasury Report System Explained

WASHINGTON — (AP)—Shapely Betty Grable, whose legs apparently attract more customers than her hand-leading husband's horn, was the highest paid Hollywood star shining on a new list of big salaries issued by the Treasury Tuesday.

The blonde Miss Grable was paid \$208,000 by 20th Century-Fox Film Corp. for the year 1945. Trumpet-blowing Harry James, her husband, received \$111,666.67 from the same company to give the couple a total salary of \$319,666.67 that year.

Top of the List
Their combined salary, however, was short of the \$568,143.60 paid to Charles F. Skouras, president of Fox West Coast Agency Corp. and National Theatres Amusement Co. Skouras topped all on the treasury list.

The Treasury listed salaries and other compensation paid to individuals by corporations during the calendar year 1945 and corporate fiscal years ending in 1946. It was only a partial listing. Other salaries will be listed in about five months.

Miss Grable edged out Olivia DeHavilland, her nearest rival, by a scant \$1,000 for top honors. The next nearest star on the list was Fred MacMurray who got \$203,525.66 from 20th Century-Fox.

Relatively Low
Miss Grable's salary didn't come up to the \$310,728 collected in the previous year by Deanna Durbin. Miss Durbin was not on the treasury's latest list. Nor did Miss Grable's salary compare with \$355,426 paid Leo McCarey, director of "Going My Way," by Paramount Pictures. For McCarey it was a considerable drop from the \$1,118,058 which he received in the previous year.

The listing is no true index to wealth. The nation's richest families, such as the Rockefellers and the Du Ponts, are not listed since their incomes are mainly from investments. Henry Ford

There were more than 800 persons on the treasury's latest list. Six persons were paid \$300,000 or more, and 30 received \$200,000 or more.

Hose Drier Delivered To City Fire Station

SPRINGFIELD — This city received Tuesday a \$495 hose drier for the fire department from the L. N. Curtis and Sons Equipment Co. in Seattle, for use by the fire department. The equipment was ordered last June.

The hose drier will be placed on a concrete base in the fire truck garage at the rear of the city hall.

The reason for the purchase, according to Fire Chief Harry Melson, is to save fire hose from molding by dampness. He said the department has lost several hundred feet of hose, because of molding. He pointed out that it costs the city \$1.66 per foot to replace two and one-half inch fire hose.

The equipment is not scheduled to be paid for until the first of next year, after taxes have been collected.

Eugene Firms Submit Bids

Two Eugene companies, M. L. and C. R. O'Neill and McNutt Bros., were waiting Tuesday to find out whether or not their low bids on road construction work would be accepted by the Oregon State Highway Commission.

O'Neill submitted the low bid of \$267,196 for work on the Juniper Butte-Crooked River section of The Dalles-California highway in Jefferson County, 6.81 miles of grading and surfacing.

McNutt's low bid of \$109,970 was for 17.11 miles of rock surfacing in Lane County, on the Globe-Elmira section of the Richardson-Eugene road. In Lincoln County, the Waldport section of the Oregon Coast Highway, 40 miles of grading and widening, got a low bid of \$41,645 from D. F. McKenzie of Salem.

The commission, noting bids were greater than engineers' estimates, deferred awarding until Thursday.

Plans approved included these paths: near Sweet Home on South Santiam highway; one along the Corvallis-Albany highway; Klamath Falls-Lakeview highway from the junior high school to the Shasta grade school; at Pendleton along the Oregon - Washington highway. The paths will be of macadam surface, four feet wide and an inch thick.

The city council Monday night passed ordinances levying assessments against property owners for the following sidewalk construction:

West side of Kincaid St. between Twenty-fifth and Twenty-sixth; north side of Thirteenth Ave. between Monroe and Almaden Sts.; both sides of Van Buren St. between Twelfth and Thirteenth Aves.; west side of Harris St. between Twenty-third and Twenty-fifth Aves.; south side of Twenty-fifth Ave. between Harris and Potter Sts.; west side of Chambers St. and south side of Thirteenth Ave. W.; and north side of Thirteenth Ave. between Chambers and Grant St.

The council also granted a right of way to the Loggers and Contractors Machinery Co. for a railroad spur.

In another ordinance the council adopted plans and specifications for the improvement of Kincaid St. between Twenty-fifth and Twenty-eighth Aves.

Wheat Crop Insuring Discontinued in Lane

Wheat crop insurance contracts covering 106 Lane County farms will be discontinued after the 1947 crop year, Ernest E. Schrenk, chairman of the county Agriculture Conservation Assn., announced Tuesday.

Schrenk said the 47 contracts in effect this year will not be affected for the current crop but will not carry over into the 1948 crop year. No new contracts will be accepted for 1948, he reported.

The county chairman explained that an amendment passed by this session of Congress to the Federal Crop Insurance Act limited the number of counties in which the wheat crop insurance program can be offered. Lane was among the Oregon counties dropped because of the small amount of wheat grown here, he said.

Navy Shifts Duty Of Personnel Choice

Candidates for aircrewman training in the U. S. Navy will no longer be selected by the office of Naval Officer Procurement, according to D. A. Ruby, in charge of the local Navy Recruiting Station in the postoffice building.

Ruby said the duty has now been assigned to the Navy Recruiting Station. Physical, mental, and age requirements differ slightly from those for regular Navy enlistment but the average young man in good health should be able to meet them. Full details are available in Room 6, postoffice.

Union Asserts Labor Needed

An "acute shortage of building laborers is being felt in the Eugene area now, Ray A. McInnis, business manager of the Eugene building trades union, disclosed Tuesday.

"We could place over 50 men on jobs right away, and will be able to use about that many when schools start and vacationing students quit," the union leader said.

He attributed the shortage to another shortage equally acute—housing. "Workers won't stay in an area, jobs or not, if they can't find a place to live, or even sleep," he said.

The scale for this type of work is \$1.38 per hour.

Voters who have moved from one address in Eugene must find out their new precinct number and voter there in the coming special election, Lloyd Howe, county clerk in charge of registration, reminded Tuesday.
