Big Four Stop In Deadlock

LONDON — (AP) — The foreign ministers' session scheduled for Saturday was postponed until Monday on British initiative, in order to allow tempers to cool after Friday night's violent argument.

The postponement was announced by the conference secretariat.

A member of the U. S. delegation said it was agreed that another session Saturday would result in quick tempers and confusion. The two day recess will give the ministers time to plan a course of action.

Frames 10 Points

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The Senate leadership Saturday announced a 10-point program in answer to President Truman's 10-point fight the high cost of living.

Eugene D. Millikin said the statement of the anti-inflation measures have the "full approval" of the House.

Republican 10-point program will not be announced until Monday night. Some Republicans, however, it did not. Sen. Ralph E. Lusk (R-Vt.) in particular, has been standing by rationing power.

House Banking Committee had approved a four-point program.

Russian Arrests Bring Protest

PARIS — (AP) — Russia added another protest to the stiff series between the Soviet and France Saturday, this one against the arrest of eight Russian citizens in France.

Authoritative sources reported that 20 members of the Soviet Repatriation Commission in France had been taken to the border of the Russian occupation zone of Germany.

A French raid on a Soviet repatriation camp outside Paris touched off the exchanges which strained diplomatic relations between France and Russia.

The Soviet Embassy here announced that it had registered an "energetic protest" for the fourth time in a month charging that eight Soviet citizens were arrested Friday in Paris and Marseille.

A note delivered to Jean Chauvel, general secretary of the French Foreign Office, demanded immediate release of the eight persons.

The Interior Ministry, responsible for the arrests of foreigners, confirmed the eight arrests. They brought to 43 the number of Soviet citizens arrested or expelled from France since early November.

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Don't Say He Was Not Ample Warned

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Sailor Escapes Possible Death

Narrowly escaping being crushed to death when the car in which he was riding overturned three times after leaving the highway at "over 80 miles an hour," Leroy Whittington, 24, of 4006 99 S., Eugene, was in good health Friday night, but had a story of death by car to tell.

Sylvia Honka, 17, of Otis, died at 5 p.m. in the Albany hospital after she was thrown from her driver's position as the caroming 1939 sedan landed 25 feet from Highway 99, about nine miles south of Albany. Her front seat companion, Robert W. Robinson, 20, of Ocean Lake, was reported in "bad" condition at the same hospital.

Whittington, a Navy cook on leave from his Boston, Mass., post, managed to come out with only a head scar and a "banged up" hip because, "I grabbed the back seat and pulled it onto my back and lay flat on the floor of the car when I saw what was going to happen."

"Amateur Driver" — Whittington said the girl who later died "was learning how to drive. She was trying to pass a large truck on the straight stretch of the highway south of Albany, when she went too far over in the other lane and caught in loose gravel."

He recalled after that the speeding car, in quick succession, turned around in the road, went off on the railroad side, turned over twice, hit an embankment in the road ditch, somersaulted 10 feet high over the embankment, and went 15 feet further before coming to rest.

"I counted every twist and turn," Whittington said, "and I could see first the girl and then the boy thrown out of the car." He said he wasn't scared a bit.

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Chinese Relief In Final Draft

Senate Ponders Full Commodity Market Probe

Pauley Held Not Only 'Dealer'

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The Senate Appropriations Committee Saturday promised an early decision on whether to touch off a full scale investigation of commodity market speculation by government officials.

The group has decided in any case that it wishes to hear further from Edwin W. Pauley, special assistant to the secretary of the Army, who already has disclosed himself as a speculator in the million dollar class. The date of the next appearance by Pauley, a former democratic national treasurer, has yet to be fixed.

Chairman Bridges (R-NH) said the decision whether to expand the inquiry will be made after the committee examines reports from the heads of five government departments on whether any of their personnel are using inside knowledge to profit in the grain markets.

In addition to the reports from the government departments, Bridges continued, his committee wants to look into:

1. "The sources of information imparted to others by those 'in the know,' which we haven't inquired about."

2. A list of large grain traders which the committee has heard is in the hands of Secretary of Agriculture Anderson and the Commodity Exchange Authority.

Victory Claim Shouted Down

ROME — (AP) — The government of Premier Alcide De Gasperi denounced Saturday as "without foundation" Communist claims of victory in the 48-hour general strike which ended at midnight.

The Communists asserted they had squeezed an addition 7,700,000 lire (\$13,547,974) in unemployment relief funds out of the government with the strike, which ended after a steady show of government might.

A communique from the office of the Christian Democrat premier said the Communist claim was unfounded and that the strike ended where it began—with an offer of 11,000,000,000 lire (\$19,344,820). Of the 11 billion total, seven was for new appropriations and four for funds already set aside for public works, the communique said.

A report that the city of Rome was prepared to add 2,000,000,000 lire (\$3,517,000) has not been confirmed. Labor had asked for a 14 billion lire program, with 10 billion in new appropriations.

The situation in Rome was back to normal Saturday morning with ending of the strike. Jeep loads of riot police circulated through the city but found no trouble.

The Communist-dominated Chamber of Labor of Rome Province, which ordered the work stoppage Wednesday night and called it off Friday night, effective at midnight, used only one word in its daily news bulletin Saturday morning: "Victory."

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Committees Reach Aid Bill Compromise

Both Houses Recess Until Monday

WASHINGTON — (UP) — Senate-House conferees late Saturday agreed on an emergency foreign aid bill authorizing \$579,000,000 in relief for France, Italy, Austria and China.

WASHINGTON — (UP) — China was the big stumbling block Saturday to agreement between House and Senate conferees on the emergency foreign aid bill, but as Sen. Arthur H. Vandenberg predicted, the compromise came before nightfall.

The question was whether the \$60,000,000 approved by the House for China would be left in the final version of the bill. The Senate had authorized stop-gap aid for France, Italy and Austria, but made no mention of the Far East.

The total amount of the bill hinges on disposition of the China question. The Senate approved the full \$579,000,000 asked by President Truman. The House voted \$500,000,000.

Both the House and Senate were in recess until Monday, but these were the developments on Capitol Hill.

Speculation—The Senate Appropriations Committee said it would make public the names of government officials who allegedly are "gambling" in the grain market.

Prices — House Republicans mapped strategy for pushing the GOP four-point anti-inflation bill through Monday under a suspension of the rules.

Russia—Some Senate Republicans want to tie a string on the Marshall Plan, curtailing U. S. trade with Russia.

Petrillo — Chairman Fred A. Hartley (R-NJ) of the House Labor Committee said he will introduce a bill to bring unions under the anti-trust laws and thus prevent James C. Petrillo from banning musical recordings.

Drive Delayed — The paper drive scheduled by the Eugene Chamber of Commerce for Sunday, Dec. 14, has been postponed until sometime in January. The lack of storage and freight car space forced the postponement.

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
