School will close Dec. 23 for the Christmas vacation which will continue until Jan. 5.

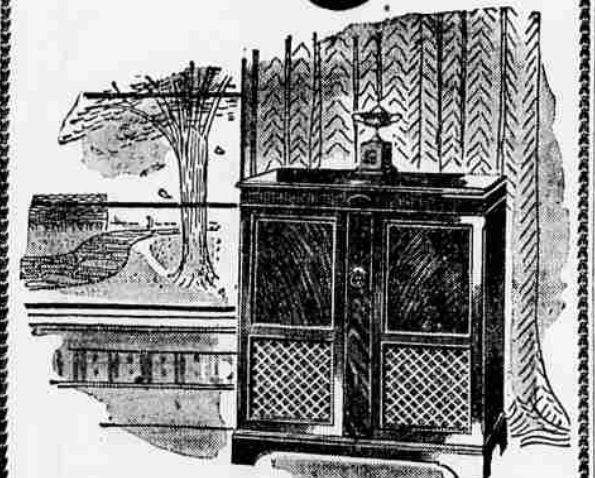
Christmas party of Willing Workers Club has been indefinitely postponed. Secret pals will disclose their identity by mail.
