 The school board met No. 85 met in special Thursday evening to pre-arrange the budget for the coming year 1948 and June 1949. According to reports posted by the clerk, Lawrence Deckert, the budget prepared, will be voted upon by the taxpayers, Jan. 2, at school house, at 8 p. m. Yanks Have Ruble Trouble

MOSCOW —(AP)—The U. S. embassy here estimated it lost about \$50,000 through Russia's revaluation of the ruble, and a spokesman indicated it might take special action by Congress to keep the embassy going on its present basis.

The embassy was caught in a snare because of the State Department's own rules, a spokesman said. Theoretically, under State Department regulations, an embassy officer could be held responsible for the entire \$50,000 loss, he said, explaining:

The State Department rules said no embassy could keep more than \$100 on hand, and that an officer would be responsible for any loss incurred in violation of the edict. But the embassy, of necessity, had to keep thousands of dollars in cash on hand.

The embassy could not keep a bank account. The comptroller general does not allow U.S. representatives abroad to pay the costs of such accounts, the spokesman added.

Swedish Exporter Regrets Dollar Lack

SEATTLE —(AP)—Trade with the Pacific Coast still is being handicapped by a scarcity of dollars in Europe. Bengt Haehnel, Stockholm, traffic manager of the Johnson Line who has been making a survey of Pacific Coast European shipping, said this week.

However, there has been a heavy movement of newsprint to the Pacific Coast and pulp to Central America, from Sweden and Finland, Haehnel said.

He toured Switzerland and Belgium before coming to the Pacific Coast and will visit Central American ports later.

British Offer US 'Trade About' on Film
LONDON —(AP)—Harold Wilson, president of the Board of Trade, has offered to let American film companies take more than 25 per cent of their earnings out of Britain, but only if American theaters show a lot more British movies.

If the Americans refuse to play ball and continue their retail-

tory ban on the shipment of new films here, Wilson said, Britain will maintain the 75 per cent tax on foreign film earnings and show Britons only British films, American reissues and other foreign movies.
