

Gov. Hall Makes Four State Appointments

SALEM —(AP)—Governor John H. Hall has reappointed Joseph O. Freck, Portland, to a six-year term on the state liquor control commission. Freck first was appointed by Hall a month ago when Hall appointed a new three-man commission.

Mrs. Georgia Patterson, Hillsboro, was reappointed to a four-year term on the state board of education.

William L. Finley, Jr., Portland, and Glen S. Macy, McMinnville, were reappointed to two-year terms on the state board of funeral directors and embalmers.

All of the appointments are effective Thursday.

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Junction City Has Expansion Problem

Junction City is right now in a "twixt and twain situation," too big for its public utilities, and on the verge of big new expansion.

By far the biggest thing in the minds of Junction City people for 1948 is the sewer, for which the election comes up early in February. In Junction City now, there is not and never has been any sanitary disposal arrangement but septic tanks and old-fashioned outdoor toilets. The flatness of the land makes the problem an acute one. Tank cleaners are busy constantly hauling the residue to the city dump, the only possible disposal grounds.

Few Building Lots
According to a recent survey by a Register-Guard correspondent at Junction City, there is hardly a building lot available for sale within the city limits. Very few in fact are still vacant, and those that are to be built upon very soon.

Exact figures on the building permits were not available at once, as the city recorder's office is being moved. But city officials said that growth through 1947 has been steady, with noticeable concentration around the high school. Junction City has no particular slum problem, no low-rent housing demand. Average valuation would fall somewhere around \$1800, but this is due more to very old homes that are still in use than to cheapness of construction.

Biggest single building project in Junction City in 1947 was the big expansion of the Hult Lumber Co., which made a portion of its loading dock into a planing mill and made important modernizations and improvements. Julius
