Eugene Power Aids Springfield

The Mountain States Power Co. at Springfield received assistance with its power supply Tuesday during the flood period from the Eugene Water Board.

The Springfield utility's normal power source, the Oregon and California transmission line, was severed south of Roseburg, and from 10 a.m. to 6:30 p.m., when the line was restored, Eugene power was tied in with the Mountain States distribution system.

Vernon J. Poindexter, superintendent of electrical operations for the Eugene Water Board, said that it was not possible to replace the entire supply of the Springfield company, but all available "dump" power was provided.

Movie Men File Suits

LOS ANGELES — (AP) — Ring Lardner, Jr., Lester Cole and Edward Dmytryk have filed suits for a total of \$3,165,925 against movie studios who removed them from their film jobs for refusal to answer questions before a House committee on un-American activities in Washington.

Dmytryk, producer and director, asked \$1,783,425 from R-K-O studio.

Lardner, a writer, demanded \$1-382,500 from Twentieth Century-Fox and asked that his \$2000 weekly contract be declared in force. Cole's suit, directed at M-G-M, asked an injunction ordering the studio to put him back on his writing job at \$1150 weekly.

122 Natives Killed In Pakistan Riots

KARACHI, Pakistan. — (AP) — Premier Mohammad Ayub Khurro of the province of Sind announced that 122 persons were killed and 200 injured in two days of communal rioting here. He said 61 of the dead were Sikhs.

The latest report was that only two or three looting incidents occurred and that they were controlled by police, who shot three looting Moslems.

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
