

Funeral Ship New Rescued

NEW YORK — (AP) — All 46 crew members of the ship *Connelly* were rescued Monday night after an all-day air and sea search for the survivors who abandoned their stricken ship in a northeast gale some 900 miles east of New York.

The half-frozen men were picked up by the Army transport *Gen. E. Callan* and the Black Diamond Line's *Union Victory* which went to the scene after intercepting the stricken *Connelly's* calls for help earlier in the day. Long-range air force planes from Kindley Field in Bermuda aided in the rescue.

The *Gen. Callan*, still standing in the *Connelly* late Monday night, messaged that the distressed vessel was ablaze "from stem to stern with constant eruptions from 10 to 50 feet."

Graham Says He Left Market

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Brig. Gen. Wallace H. Graham testified Tuesday that he got out of the wheat market — except for one small trade — after President Truman criticized commodities speculators last October. But he said he continued to deal in cotton until Dec. 18.

Under oath before the Senate Appropriations Committee, the President's personal physician said, too, that he assumed personal responsibility for the trades. Previously, he had said publicly in a statement that his broker made commodity purchases for him without his knowledge.

Graham told the committee that all of his dealings on the commodities exchanges, including cotton and cottonseed oil, were closed out Dec. 18.

Rescue Barge Sends Own SOS

SEATTLE — (AP) — A self-propelled Army barge, believed to have nine crew members aboard, sent its own urgent distress call Tuesday after apparently hitting a small island south of the Alaska Peninsula while en route to the rescue of crewmen of another grounded ship.

District Coast Guard headquarters announced the 86-foot BSP 1927 (barge, self-propelled) had radioed that it was sinking about 40 miles southwest of Cold Bay, which is near the end of the Alaska Peninsula.

The message, received in Ketchikan and relayed here, said it was on Pin Point, in the Deer Island vicinity. The Coast Guard reported the Cutter Cedar had been diverted to the barge's aid from its rescue mission to the Aleutian Mail, which grounded early Monday on the southwest tip of Unimak Island, the first in the Aleutian chain.

Eastern Plane Crash Kills Five

WASHINGTON — (AP) — An Eastern Airlines plane with nine persons aboard crashed on the outskirts of Washington during a rainstorm early Tuesday, killed five and injuring four.

The plane, en route from Houston, Tex., to Boston, plowed into a grove of trees on the Maryland side of the Potomac River a few miles from the National Airport shortly after reporting it was coming in for a landing.

The twin-engine DC-3 was demolished, but there was no fire. Eastern Airlines said the cause had not been determined, adding that the pilot checked in by radio at 4:27 a. m. EST, but failed to make contact with the airport control later as scheduled.

The dead were three passengers, the pilot and co-pilot. Three injured passengers and the flight attendant were taken to casualty hospital in Washington.

Rain, slush, and muddy roads in the area hampered police and others in rescue work.

Rocket Sleds Beat Bullets

MUROK AIR BASE, Cal. — (AP) — The Air Forces announced Tuesday that the rocket-powered sleds have streaked along a set of railroad tracks faster than a bullet, beating the airplane to the honor of cracking the sonic wall.

The air force said it used jet bomb launching sleds for the experiment. They were clamped to tracks 2,000 feet long over which they skated at speeds over 1,000 miles an hour.

In the first high speed run on Sept. 20, 1946, the unmanned sled flashed the distance of the track in less than two seconds. When it hit the end of the rails, the sled hurtled out across the desert until it came to rest.

A top speed of 1,012 miles an hour was recorded on the first try. Since then the jet-propelled sleds have hit even greater speeds. The top was reached on March 7, 1947, when a sled hit 1,019 miles an hour.

Florence Checks Flood Hazard

FLORENCE — A drainage ditch to carry off surface water that has accumulated in northwest Florence in the area of Sixth and Monroe streets, is being constructed with Earl Stewart being the contractor. The work is being done by shovel, and the 1250 foot ditch will be used in the west Florence sewer extension. It will run from First street just west of the Mar-dock residence along First street to the west side of Quincy street and north to Sixth.

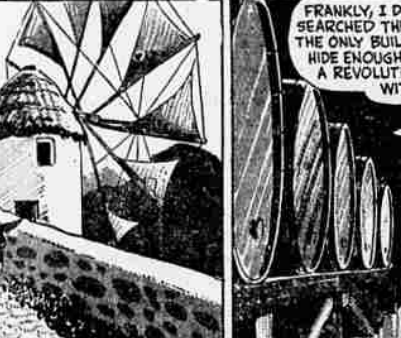

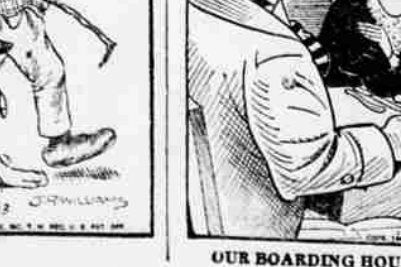

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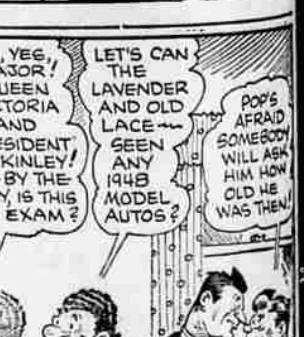
