Johnson was voted the most outstanding fighter ward at the Ramblers card in Portland last year, and was also runner-up in the Golden Gloves Tourney for the lightweight crown.

In the evening's special event, Bill Ashbaugh, making his debut for the Eugene club, will play host to Dave Shalle of Chemawa in the heaviest fight of the ten bout card, with both boys clashing in a light heavyweight battle.

Art Young, Chemawa 153 pounder, meets "H. C." Wyatt of Eugene and Earl Williams of the local crew and Louis Belgrade tangle in the lightest bout of the card in the opening bout at 8:30, both weighing in at 105 pounds.

Center Roger Wiley remained on the bench Monday as Coach John Warren started preparation for the Oregon-OSC game at Corvallis Saturday night.

The Webfoot center suffered a slight back injury in the two-game split series against Washington here last weekend, but is expected to be ready for action Saturday.

As insurance, Warren gave special attention to Bob Amacher and Bob Don, reserve centers.

Archie Gacek, forward transfer from WSC, quit the squad to devote more time to studies. Jim Bocchi, sophomore from Klamath Falls who has been out with a foot injury, joined the squad as a forward prospect.

Dick Wilkins, who joined the squad only last week, has assumed the individual scoring lead with 14 field goals and 31 points. Al Popick is second with 19, followed by Jim Bartlett with 16, and Stan Williamson with 14. Williamson leads in freethrows with 12.

Thirteen players saw action in the series in which Oregon and Washington both collected an aggregate 127 points, Washington leading in field goals and personal fouls, Oregon leading in freethrows and freethrow shooting.

Matchmaker Don Owen announced Tuesday that the Hart-Williams skirmish would headline his weekly show and that two other outstanding matches would be signed later in the week.

Hart, in superb physical condition, has been knocking over all opponents in the midwest since Canadian hunting and fishing November when he closed his lodge for the winter season. He was extremely popular here last winter and returns with ambitions to win both coast crowns.

Owen said the winner of Saturday's match would be in line for a shot at Frank Stojack's junior heavyweight title.

Williams will give Hart the toughest kind of a battle. The rugged Chicago villain has been making an impressive record through the northwest for the past few months. The match is certain to be a Donnybrook.

Now that the Duck season is over no doubt many hunters are wondering why they missed so many shots. Always remember a duck can fly 90 feet a second. A fast flying duck can fly 10 or 15 feet in a fraction of a second, enough to escape your gun pattern. It takes time to pull your trigger too, don't forget that. Fred Eichen says—Take a good lead on your duck, 4 or 5 ft. at 40 yards, and you won't be far off.

In every community there are a certain number of outdoor lovers who enjoy a good trap shoot. A trap affords excellent practice for the field shot and teaches safety as well. There have been in the past few weeks some trap shoots held in and around Eugene. No doubt many more will be held in the next few weeks. This is a swell opportunity to sharpen up your shooting eye.
