

Ship Program Seems Shelved

WASHINGTON — (AP) — A \$150,000,000-a-year, four-year passenger ship building program recommended recently by a presidential advisory committee appeared Tuesday to have been shelved by the administration.

The other \$15,320,000, he said, would be obligated in contracts for work to be done after June 30, 1949.

An administration official was asked whether this meant pigeon-holing the advisory committee's call for an immediate start toward building 46 passenger ships in a four year period said "we just decided to ask (Congress) for

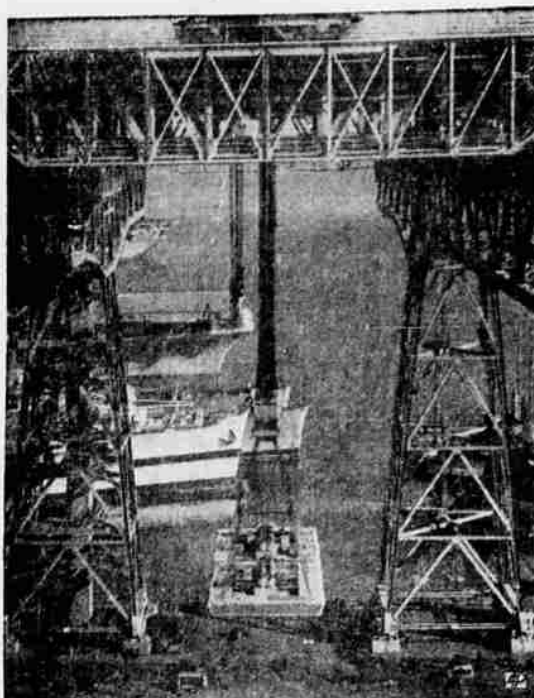

Mother Admits Child's Murder

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., (AP)—An attractive young mother confessed Tuesday she strangled her three-year-old son to death with a diaper in order to obtain \$1,000 from the child's insurance policy to meet loan shark payments.

Mrs. Alec E. Fitzhugh, 21, wife of an electrician, showed solicitor Emmett Perry how she squeezed the diaper around her blond, blue-eyed son Johnny while he slept in his crib.

Solve Worries
The mother said she thought she could solve her financial worries by collecting her child's insurance policy.

Perry said her only tears during the questioning came when she told of garrotting the child.

"I then pulled things from several dresser drawers to make it look like a burglar killed Johnny," she related.

Mrs. Fitzhugh, who lives in a garage apartment behind her mother-in-law's home, said the slaying occurred about 12:30 a. m. Her husband had gone to work at the Tennessee Coal, Iron and Railroad Co., an hour and one-half earlier.

The couple's other child, a three-month old daughter, was asleep in the mother's bed at the time.

She told officers that about 1 a. m. she picked up the child's lifeless body and carried it to her mother-in-law's home.

Mrs. Fitzhugh told solicitor Perry that her husband had borrowed \$50 each from three loan companies and that one threatened only Monday to sue or garnish her husband's wages.

Solicitor Perry said he asked her what they did with the original \$150 loan.

"We wasted it and got in debt all over again," she answered.

She said her husband earned \$148 cents an hour.

Dairy Improvements Program Proposed for Lane County Area

A three-pronged program for the improvement of Lane County's dairy industry has been proposed by the dairy project committee of the Lane County Agricultural Council.

At a meeting Friday, H. P. Ewalt, extension dairyman at Oregon State College, noted that the dairy population throughout Oregon has decreased, while discussion disclosed that the cow population of Lane County alone probably has decreased 1000 during the past 18 months.

Calf Program
Under herd improvement, the committee proposed a program to promote the raising and saving of more good dairy calves, and improvement in the quality of bulls.

It was voted to support the Lane County Dairy Herd Improvement Assn. and to conduct educational programs on herd management and dairy health.

In its recommendations on the feeding aspects of the industry the committee recommended the use of more grass silage, and voted to produce a program designed to produce better hay and silage, and improvement of pastures.

Field Meetings
Field meetings on farms where grass silage and pasture are used extensively were requested. The meetings would be in both valley and coastal sections.

It was pointed out that efficient use of silage and pasture would reduce the cost of production.

Complete Directory
Under the third section of the program, the committee voted to assist County Agent O. S. Fletcher in compiling a directory of all local pure-bred breeders, and voted support of 4-H dairy clubs and the dairy work of the Future Farmers of America.

Recommendations for two demonstrations will be considered at a special meeting of the agricultural council along with recommendations of other project committees.

Missionaries Killed in China

NANKING — (AP) — Two American women missionaries and a Finnish missionary have been killed by bandits northwest of Hankow, and an attempt is being made to evacuate 20 other Americans from the area, according to a message received by the U. S. embassy in Nanking Tuesday.

The message, sent by Edward Nelson from the covenant mission at Siangyang, said the missionaries belonged to a group from the Evangelical Church of the Covenant, with headquarters in Chicago. Siangyang is 188 miles northwest of Hankow, and is situated on the Han River in Hupeh Province.

The dead were identified as Esther Victoria Nordling, Chicago; Martha Anderson, Minneapolis; and Dr. Alexis Berg of Finland.
