

## Lane Law Officers Featured In Police Journal Write-Ups

Law enforcement activities in Eugene and Lane County are featured in three of the major articles in the current issue of the Police Journal, official magazine of the Lower Columbia River Peace Officers' Assn. "Meet Sheriff Swartz" is the title of one article written and illustrated by Bill Runyan, Dallas.

Another feature presents the views of Eugene's new police chief, Keith Jones, on the relationship of juvenile problems and police work.

**Change Reviewed**  
The third report, telling of chief-of-police changes throughout

the Northwest during the past several months, reviews the change at Eugene. Chief Jones' picture appears on the cover of the magazine as do those of Portland's retiring chief, Loen V. Jenkins, and L. L. Pittinger, ex-chief of the Eugene department now holding a similar post at Oregon City.

Runyan's feature on Lane County's sheriff, C. A. Swartz, tells of his years of experience as the head of a law enforcement agency which covers 4578.5 square miles of territory. The article tells of Swartz' hope to add at least two men to his present force of 20 deputies, five of whom are in the criminal department most of the others are in the tax department.

**Sheriff Swartz**  
The sheriff's praise of cooperative arrangements with the Eugene city police and the state police is told by Runyan, and he credits these arrangements with having "affected a considerable saving for the taxpayers, plus a tight-knit, efficient police service for the district."

The Police Journal article reporting Chief Jones' outlook on the juvenile problem is based on a talk he made before the criminology class of the Portland extension of the University of Oregon.

**Juvenile Cases**  
Jones told this audience that juveniles are the responsibility of the home, church and school rather than the police department, and that if these agencies would do their part, fewer juveniles would need to come before the police.

Jones also presented a sketch on the history of the police profession, and spoke of the outstanding problems currently to be solved in further improving the profession.

Improved salaries, he said, would work to the general benefit of the public by attracting top-notch men as police officers and would prevent them from being induced to take other offers in the field of industry. Higher pay would also improve the social status of police officers, Jones said, a result which would be reflected in better service to the public.

## Bicycle Licensing Progress Reported

**SPRINGFIELD**—The city police department Tuesday had issued a total of 387 bicycle licenses for 1948, according to Police Chief Clell Pryor.

The licenses which cost 35 cents, may be obtained by calling at the rear entrance to the police station at the city hall.

Chief Pryor said he expects that 1000 bike licenses will be issued before the end of the year. In 1947 the city issued 850 and in 1946 the total was 750 Pryor said.

City Recorder K. R. Gile reminded again Monday that dog licenses are available at the city hall. The fees are \$1.00 for males and \$1.50 for females. The city retains 80 per cent of the fees for dog licenses acquired at the city hall, with the remaining 20 per cent going to the county. Since Jan. 1, the city has issued 58 dog licenses, Gile said.

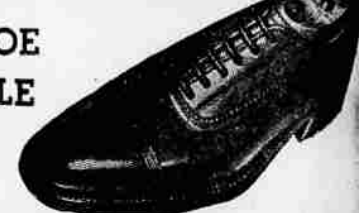
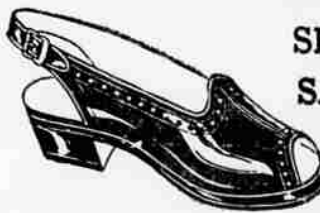
