

Improvement Group Plans Program for Lane Agriculture

Program covering seed improvement, production, forage and weed control has been planned by the Lane County Agricultural Council.

The group recommended demonstration of the influence of phosphate on subterranean and alfalfa, a demonstration of the certification of seed crops, and control of the 19 forage crop nurseries. The committee is working for the establishment of nurseries.

DDT recommended that farmland be controlled through dusting with DDT. The production of alfalfa seed be increased. The committee also has a plan for the control of weeds through the short rotation program on the land of the noxious weed.

Lane County was producing a record crop of alfalfa through the short rotation program on the land of the noxious weed.

General to Talk On UO Campus

Herbert C. Holdridge, retired Army brigadier-general and co-chairman of the Armed Forces Committee of the American Veterans Committee, will speak on "the new American militarism" before an audience of townspeople and university students in Room 3 of Fenton Hall on the campus Thursday, Jan. 22, at 7:30 p.m.

General Holdridge qualifies as an "insider" by his record of 30 years' service.

In the second World War, General Holdridge initiated and established on an operating basis the psychological testing program, the Army classification program, military classification of records and the Army "machine records" system of personnel accounting. In addition, he established the Adjutant General's school, Fort Washington, Md., and 19 Army administration schools.

The general was honorably retired in 1944. Two years later he went on record before Congress in opposition to compulsory military training and extension of the draft. Sponsor of the lecture is the University of Oregon Educational Activities board.

ROSEBURG MEET

\$67 Million On Alaska Plan

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The United States will spend \$67,832,000 building up its Alaskan defenses against the possibility of a trans-polar air attack if the House approves a measure now awaiting consideration.

The funds would be used to set up airway communications centers, and improve living accommodations and operational facilities at Alaskan bases.

Possible War
Air force officials, emphasizing the need for stronger Alaskan defenses, have pointed out that these bases would comprise the first U. S. line of defense in the event of an East-West conflict.

The Senate earlier this week passed a \$354,000,000 appropriation measure for armed force station improvements, and sent the bill to the House. It includes \$49,400,000 for Army and Air Force projects in Alaska, and \$18,432,500 for improving Alaskan naval stations.

Additional Million
This would be in addition to the \$70,000,000 already authorized by Congress for Army and Air Force construction in Alaska.

Ladd Field, Fairbanks, would come in for the lion's share of funds under the proposal. It would get a total of \$20,694,850 for barracks, family quarters, utilities, hospital and operational facilities. Of this sum, \$11,694,850 would be authorized for spending during fiscal 1948.

The Air Force announced recently that its planes now can fly anywhere in the Arctic, even under the most hazardous weather conditions. But it urged improvement of airfields there and said work is in progress on an air network.

The construction projects, proposed in the bill now before Congress, include airways communications centers at Adak, Anchorage, Big Delta, Ketchikan, Cathedral Bluff, Fort Randall, Juneau, Northway, Naknek, Skagway, Lena Point, Bethel, Kodiak, Nome, Sitka and between Haines and Juneau.

Wheat Ships Clear After Labor Dispute

SEATTLE — (AP) — Two wheat ships were cleared Thursday for sailing to Japan after the Marine Cooks and Stewards Union and operators agreed to submit their differences to San Francisco negotiators.

The vessels, the freighter Beloit Victory at Tacoma and the freighter Francis Marion here, had been delayed by a dispute over payment of overtime for various duties, including making oilers' bunks.

Progressives Hold Meeting

CHICAGO — (AP) — Endorsement of the presidential candidacy of Henry A. Wallace and preliminary formation of his Third Party campaign strategy are expected at the second annual convention of the Progressive Citizens of America here Saturday and Sunday.

More than 500 Progressive delegates from 26 states will hear the former Democratic vice president outline his "peace and prosperity" platform in a convention speech late Saturday afternoon.

The convention does not plan to nominate Wallace on a Third Party ticket. It isn't intended as a nominating convention.

Morris Schedules Busy Talk Calendar
