'Gray Market' Gets Warning

WASHINGTON — (AP) — A Senate committee told the steel industry Wednesday it must take the lead in wiping out a flourishing "gray market" if it hopes to avoid new government controls.

A report filed with the Senate by Chairman Martin (R-Pa.) of the small business subcommittee on steel said members of his group themselves oppose the renewal of wartime government powers to divide up the supply.

The report declared, however, that something must be done to curb the gray market deals in which steel is sold at far above normal prices.

Despite its public hearings on the subject, the committee said, "the gray market still flourishes and has, if anything, become better organized."

Westfir Folks Asked To Share Power With Oakridge Home Users

OAKRIDGE — The following bulletin, put out by the Edward Hines Lumber Co., and distributed to all employees and residents of Westfir, will be of interest to persons living in Oakridge.

"Owing to the tremendous demand for power, we are experiencing difficulty in supplying current to the point that we have been forced to cut-off the Oakridge district for long periods of time, which is causing a hardship on them, particularly on their refrigeration, cooking and automatic heating devices. We are asking your cooperation to help alleviate the above condition in so far as practicable by curtailing your own use of power between the hours of 7 a. m. and 4 p. m. daily, except Sunday, to the absolute minimum of actual necessary use. We thank you in anticipation of your help and cooperation."

The company further announced that between and including Dec. 17 and Jan. 6 their switches had been locked for only four hours and 44 minutes. In only one instance, on Dec. 17, was power shut off by the Hines Company for more than one continuous hour. On this occasion the power was cut for 75 minutes.

It has been reported from various sources that many of the recent blackouts resulted from cut-offs so that lines could be repaired and new lines built.

In the evening, only one judging ring will be in use, and the evening program opens with the children's showmanship class. Any child under 16 is eligible for this, entries will be accepted until class time, and any dog benched at the show may be used.

Judging will be by Ivan Clark of Portland, a specialist in children's work, and the emphasis will be on the skill of the children in handling their temperamental charges. Miss Dorothy Endicott, 14, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Gerald Endicott of Eugene, will present the trophy.

Champions

Next event is the "Parade of Champions," or dogs which have won 15 points in accredited competition, recognized by the American Kennel Club. It is possible that one or more championships will be finished at this show.

During the day, the dogs will have been judged by breeds. After the champion parade, Helen Rosemont, Dr. Rae Smith, and Lud Burkett will judge the various winners by six groups: working dogs, sporting dogs, non-sporting dogs, hounds, terriers, and toy dogs. The best of these six dogs will be judged "best in show" by Mrs. Rosemont.

Trophies have been donated for the various classes by Eugene firms and individuals.

Mapleton Sees Mill Expansion

MAPLETON — E. W. Holmes was named resident manager of Siuslaw Forest Products Inc., effective Jan. 1. The corporation installed a new core mill in the late fall that converts peeler cores into 2 by 4 — 8 foot dimensions. The new mill has a capacity of 20,000 board feet per day. Additional improvements include a complete re-ramping of planing mill facilities. The planer is now housed in a new building. A longer sorting chain and a tilting hoist and feed table have been added that increase the mill's capacity to surface lumber.

An automatic sprinkler system is now being installed by Viking Sprinkler Co. of Seattle. The water tank has a capacity of 400,000 gallons and the new system gives fire protection to the entire operation.

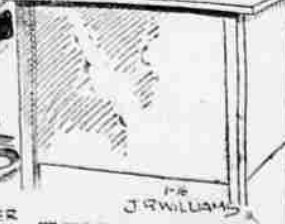

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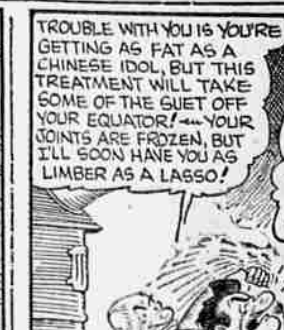
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
