

Oregon Faculty Members Set Academy Talk; Smith Chosen

meeting of the academy of Williamette University in Salem Saturday. Dr. Smith, who has made his home in Eugene for many years, joined the faculty of the university in 1914, and taught until 1920 when he went to the Philippine Islands for two years. He returned in 1922, and remained with the university until his retirement July 1, 1947.

Since his retirement, Dr. Smith has been doing consulting work, and has finished an important job for the government on Indian lands in southwestern Oregon. He is currently serving on the Oregon Geographic Board, and has been writing and lecturing.

The first session of the academy will be a council meeting Friday afternoon, followed by a public evening meeting at which Dr. D. Curtis Mumford will speak on "Food and the Future." Dr. Mumford was a recent delegate to the international conference of agricultural economists in England.

Meeting Topics
Dean Lawrence Riggs, Williamette University, will open the general program Saturday morning with a welcoming address, and the balance of the morning will be devoted to section meetings for biology, chemistry, geology and geography.

Soft Shell Clam Eater Says He Can Best Hard Shell Champ

SEATTLE (U.S.)—Plans for the first coast-to-coast clambake were well underway Friday with a press club offering to pay transportation fares of the Cape Cod fisherman who challenged the Pacific Coast's world champion hard shell clam eater.

The clam eating champion of the world will be crowned in the National Clam Bowl here Jan. 24.

Challenger Webb Harrison, chairman of the Washington State Press Club's round table, said his group would bring Frank Vierra, the challenger, to Seattle from Martha's Vineyard, Mass.

"We'll pay that soft-shelled artist's way out here—and back if necessary," Harrison said.

He added that he anticipated only a one-way fare.

"When Vierra eats our little necks, he won't want to go back," Harrison mused.

Light Training
Richard Watson, the Seattle cab driver who was crowned world champion by the Pacific Freestyle Amateur Clam Eating Contest Assn., entered light training immediately. He said he started out with a gallon of clam nectar for breakfast.

No comment from Vierra was available. A telephone call by the Press Club to the challenger's residence in Massachusetts revealed he had "gone fishing for five days."

Vierra, when told Wednesday of Watson's record of eating 120 hard shelled little necks in ten minutes, laughed and said most Cape Cod salts would consider it a diet.

"I can eat 150 of those appetizers in ten minutes," he said. "Watson ought to try soft shells for real eating."

Vierra claimed he could eat any man in the world "clam for clam."

Planners Reject Zone Changes, Ask Legion Request Revision

SPRINGFIELD—The city planning commission in a meeting Wednesday night rejected a petition signed by property owners in and adjacent to the area on the south side of C St. between Fifth and Sixth Sts. to change the zone classification from single to multiple family.

The planners did not intend this to be their final action on the proposal but suggested that the American Legion, which circulated the petition, (they desire to construct a building at Eighth and C Sts.) circulate another with the idea of requesting a variance from zone regulations which would allow construction of the building without changing the adjacent area to multiple family zone.

Others Denied
Two other requests also were denied by the commission.

One request was made by W. E. Palmer of Klamath Falls who purchased property on the south side of Main St. near Eighteenth St. and wanted it changed from a heavy industry classification so that he could build homes there.

Motel Rejected
The other request denied was from a McMinnville man who desired to construct a motel at Seventeenth and C Sts. On the vote the planners were of the opinion that such a proposal would not be "in the best public interest."

The commission recommended that the city council hold a public hearing, as required in the zoning ordinance, on a proposal to construct a Catholic Church between Fourteenth and Sixteenth on E St.

Scott Wright, who has been a member of the commission since last October, was elected president of the group. He replaces Oscar Shockley, who resigned from the planning commission Jan. 1.

Irving Firemen Get Phone, Plan Meet

Installation of a new emergency telephone for the Irving fire department was reported by Howard Humphrey, secretary-treasurer of the department, Friday.

Residents are advised to use the new telephone number, 6480, for emergency only since it is synchronized with the siren and will also serve to alarm all volunteers in the community.

A meeting Friday night at the Irving fire hall, at 8 p.m., will see a drive to obtain more volunteers for the department.

COSMIC RAYS SCRUTINIZED
CHICAGO (U.P.)—University of Chicago scientists are using a B-29 superfortress to help solve the mysteries of cosmic rays. Dr. Marcel Schein of the Institute for Nuclear Studies, one of three institutes in the university's new \$12,000,000 atomic research program, is conducting the experiments in cooperation with the Navy and Army Air Forces. The B-29, equipped with a laboratory, can reach an altitude of 40,000 feet.
