Farmers Seek Change in Plan

Three Lost Valley farmers who said they represented 159 residents of the area near Dexter lashed out at the U.S. Army engineer's Lost Creek road (Meridian Dam) relocation plans Saturday.

In a hearing before the Lane County court, the men agreed with the court, and County Surveyor P. M. Morse, that relocation plans for the county road one half mile south of Dexter, to make way for the relocated Southern Pacific main line, are "stupid."

The Army engineers had proposed to add over a mile of rough road with turns sharper than right angle, they contended, to keep costs down. Now the county road runs along Lost Creek to Dexter.

The trouble lies, petitioners say, just south of Dexter where the railroad will cross Lost Creek and the old county road. The engineers want to move the county road up the hill and around the 105-foot railroad fill. The petitioners want a tunnel under the railroad.

The county court promised to write a letter to the engineers asking for a further hearing on the plan.
