

Execution Set, Still Protested

SALEM — (AP) — Black-bordered invitations to the execution at 8:30 a.m. Friday of Wardell M. Henderson, 27, Portland Negro, were received Wednesday by newsmen and official witnesses.

They were sent by Prison Warden George Alexander. Henderson will die in the prison gas chamber for the murder in Portland of Walter Poole.

Henderson's last hope of escaping the gas chamber disappeared Tuesday when Governor John H. Hall denied his appeal for clemency.

PORTLAND — (AP) — Oregon Democratic Women Wednesday protested Governor Hall's decision not to commute the death sentence of Wardell Henderson, 26, convicted in the slaying of a Vancouver, Wash., resident.

Henderson faces execution in the gas chamber at the state penitentiary at Salem Friday for the 1945 killing of Walter Poole.

The Democratic Women's organization reported members had voted Tuesday night to ask the governor to reconsider Henderson's case because of charges by several groups that jurors in the trial were prejudiced.

George Thomas, president of the Oregon branch of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, said he also has protested the execution. He said "statements of jurors clearly show the verdict in the Henderson case was influenced by race prejudice. His execution will be a severe blow to democracy and justice."

Tractor Firm Seeks Damages

COLUMBUS, O. — (AP) — A damage suit asking \$11,302,590 against the Ford Motor Co., Dearborn Motor, Inc., the Ohio Tractor & Implement Co., and officials of the three firms was filed Tuesday in federal court here.

The action, brought by Elmer E. Schatz, his wife and two corporations which they control — the Truck-Tractor Equipment Co. and the Truck-Tractor Equipment, Inc. — charges the Ford group with illegal conspiracy to deprive the Schatz companies of their business of distributing and selling Ferguson farm tractors and implements in the state of Ohio.

The suit asserts that Harry Ferguson invented a new type of farm tractor which the elder Henry Ford agreed in 1938 to manufacture and which the Ferguson organization marketed together with a line of farm implements developed by Ferguson. Severance of this agreement last July 1 resulted in another suit, filed in New York earlier this month, by Ferguson against the Ford Company and officials for \$251,000,000 damages.

The Schatz complaint alleges that the desire of Henry Ford II to provide large compensation for his company's executives caused them to engage in various acts to force the Columbus, O., dealer out of business.

The \$11,302,590 claim for damages is based upon alleged destruction of the truck-tractor equipment business and asks triple damages for breach of the anti-trust laws.
