Included in the presentation will be selections by Beethoven, Haydn, and Bizet. The concert will start at 8 p.m. in the music school auditorium. It will be open to the public at no charge.

Morse Against General for Job

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Senator Wayne L. Morse (R-Ore) said Wednesday he made the motion that reaffirmed the senate armed services committee action rejecting legislation to permit appointment of Maj. Gen. Laurence S. Kuter as chairman of the Civilian Aeronautics Board while retaining his army rank and pay.

Morse said his motion at the committee meeting Tuesday, when the senators refused to accede to a personal plea from President Truman for the legislation, was seconded by Senator Byrd (D-Va) and was adopted without a vote against it, though three Democratic members voted "present." Senator Bridges (R-NH) told reporters the Democrats were Tydings (D-Md), Kilgore (D-WVa) and Hill (D-Ala).

Morse told a reporter that in making his motion he told the committee the President's position in insisting on Kuter's appointment "is indefensible."

"The people expect and want Congress to follow the principle that the military be kept out of civilian posts," Morse said he told the committee. "The people want us to return to the principle of civilian jobs for civilians. I know of no action by the committee since the war that has received more universal acclaim than our insistence that a civilian be appointed chairman of the Civil Aeronautics Board."

Rebates Ire Fishbein

LOS ANGELES — (AP) — Felony prosecution for doctors' rebates and fee splitting was advocated Wednesday by Dr. Morris Fishbein, spokesman for the nation's medical profession.

"Just as we drive the quacks from our profession, we must drive out practices that make medicine a business instead of a profession," the editor of the American Medical Assn. Journal told a group of physicians and surgeons.

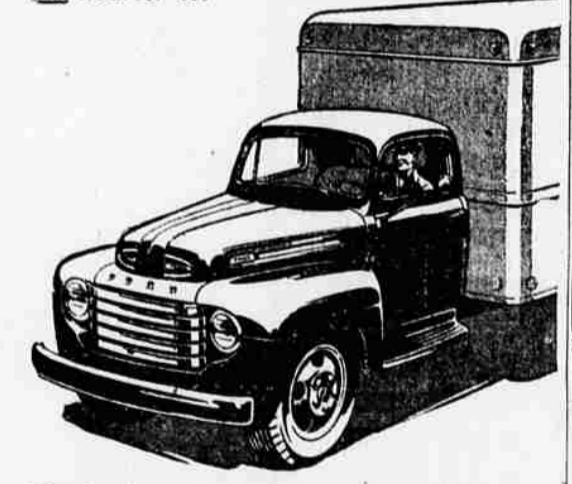
