Planting of Roses Theme of Speaker

Henry Jorgenson, president of the Eugene Rose Society, who was speaker for Eugene Garden Club Tuesday evening, told of roses used in the perennial border. He said first that they are a true and satisfactory perennial, and with the right sort of pruning will bloom continuously from May until heavy frost. He said that roses grown in the Pacific northwest have a particular advantage for gardeners in that they are budded onto roots that are not too particular about drainage, as the eastern grown roses are.

Mr. Jorgenson described the different types of roses, telling of the miniature roses which are new. They were of French origin, but were lost for a while until an English botanist working in the Swiss Alps found one plant in a Swiss home. They do not grow more than six or eight inches high, and the tiny buds are about the size of a grain of wheat. They are very hardy and make a charming border.

An important point about the use of sawdust as mulch was brought out. If it is dug in, a nitrogen fertilizer should be used to aid decomposition.

Charles Anderson showed two rolls of roses pictures in full color, telling the names and answering questions about varieties.

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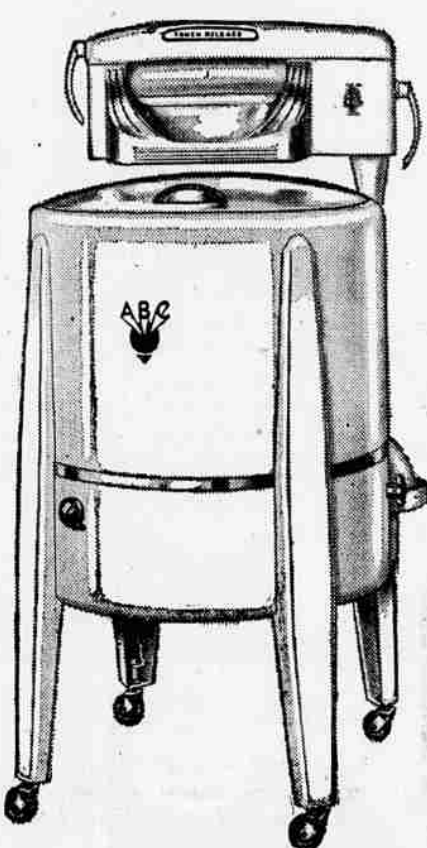
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
