Speaks at Florence

FLORENCE—Local people will hear two addresses here Monday, Jan. 26, by Dr. James Millar, a director of the Good Citizenship Foundation. Both talks will be given at the St. Lawrence High School. He will speak at 1:30 p. m. to members of the Home Extension Units of western Lane County and at 8 p. m. will address the general public.

A native of Ireland, the doctor received his degree at Denver University, he did graduate work at the University of Chicago and Oxford and Cambridge universities in England. He was a faculty member at the College of Idaho before joining the citizenship foundation at Portland. Before the late war he traveled extensively in Europe and Asia. The meeting here had been scheduled earlier this month, but adverse weather forced a postponement.

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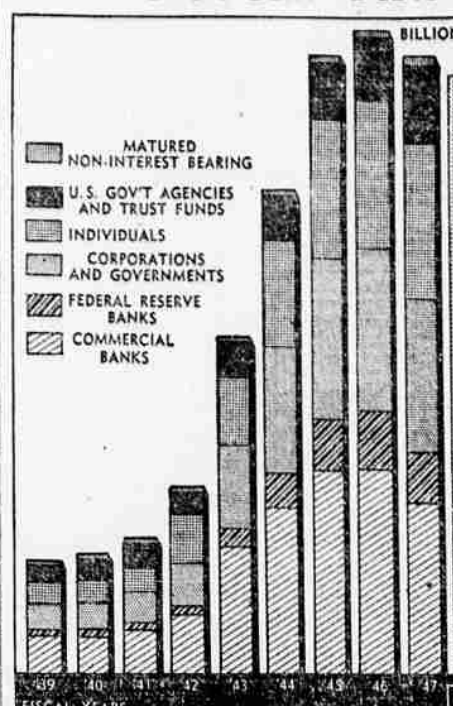
